Birch goes to the dogs?




DNS (Did Not Sail) does not count against season score, however sailor must complete 2/3 of races to qualify for season. DNF (Did Not Finish), DSQ (Disqualified) scores as one place worse than last place (if 5 boats finished, you would have finished 6th, will be scored as 7th place).

DNF, DSQ not counted toward minimum number of races needed.

CB - sailor who serves on Committee Boat receives their season average place as of that date - counted toward season total. Season Points are awarded on Square of 40 system (1st = 40 squared = 1600, 2nd = 39 squared, etc.)

Season Place = total season points/number of races attempted

Crew - Counted toward completed races, Points go to skipper of boat.

Flu shots and you

The 2014-2015 flu shot has arrived!! It came in 2 weeks ago and I have already received mine. Receiving the flu shot is the #1 best way to protect yourself against the flu this year!

Who should get the flu shot?

The CDC recommends that everybody age 6 months of age and older should be vaccinated. The only people who should not get the flu vaccine are those who have had a serious allergic reaction to the vaccine, and those who have a rare, severe paralytic disorder called Guillain–Barré Syndrome. If you have a high fever or feel very ill, you should wait until you feel better before getting immunized. Certain high risk groups such as pregnant females, health care workers, diabetics, asthmatics, lung or heart disease, children, and people age 65+ should always receive the shot because these people are most at risk for flu complications if they catch the flu.


When should I get the shot?

The CDC recommends that you should be vaccinated as soon as the vaccine becomes available. Flu season typically starts around October and peaks in January, but outbreaks can occur at any time. It takes 2 weeks after your shot before full immunity takes place, so it's important to be vaccinated before the flu season actually begins! In the ideal world, everybody would be vaccinated before October. Since the vaccine is available right now, you should head to the pharmacy after you finish this article.

What's in the flu shot?

The flu shot always contains at least 3 strains of influenza virus that research indicates will be most common during the upcoming season. The 3 strains that are covered in the 2014-2015 shot are

A/California/7/2009 (H1N1)pdm09-like virus,
 an A/Texas/50/2012 (H3N2)-like virus,



3.) a B/Massachusetts/2/2012-like virus.

I'm not an immunologist so this all looks like gibberish to me, but I do know that research shows these are the 3 strains that are most likely to cause flu outbreaks this season. However, viruses are constantly changing so the shot will not protect against 100 percent of the circulating strains. Last year's flu shot was considered to be 60 percent effective against circulating strains.

Can you still get the flu if you received the flu shot?


YES!!! The shot is intended to cover the influenza strains that are most likely to cause flu outbreaks, but other strains of influenza still exist. If you catch a strain that is not covered by the shot, you will get sick. Also, as mentioned above it takes 2 weeks for the shot to take effect so you can still get sick during that 2 week period. In addition, you can get the rhinovirus which produces flu like symptoms, but is not the flu. Keep in mind it is IMPOSSIBLE to catch the flu from the shot alone. You do not have to worry about catching the flu from the flu shot.

Side effects of the flu shot

Side effects of the flu shot include pain and redness at the injection site, low grade fever, and mild body aches. Typically, the only side effect people experience is a sore arm. The soreness only lasts for a few hours and will go away quicker if you get the injection in your dominant arm. For this reason, it is recommended to get the shot in your dominant arm.

For more AWESOME information, please go to www.cdc. gov/flu or www.vaccines.com. There is a lot of misconception out there about vaccines, but overall vaccines are both safe and effective for protecting ourselves against disease.

Billions and billions of stars

In the past, I've drawn inspiration from a number of different sources. "Star-Date," a daily radio program put out by the University of Texas McDonald Observatory, is one example. StarDate can be heard at various times each day on National Public Radio. Another resource for me has been The Abrams Planetarium at University of Michigan. I've subscribed to their monthly star calendar for many years. Carl Sagan is also one of my cosmic heroes. He, along with the aforementioned and others, have fueled my passion for what goes on overhead every day and night of our lives.

Carl Sagan had, what has become for him, a signature phrase — there are "billions upon billions" of planets, stars and galaxies out there. And I've pretty much written and/or plagiarized about all of them, multiple times. So where do you suppose I can go from here?

I'll leave you with three things, two of which have to do with death. First, some doomed planets.

A star in Cygnus, the swan, is entering the final stages of life, so it's starting to puff up like a giant balloon. And that's trouble for two of its planets. Over the next couple of hundred million years, they'll be roasted and then engulfed by the dying star.

The system is known as Kepler 56. It's about halfway between bright Vega, which is high in the east at nightfall, and slightly fainter Deneb, the tail of the swan, to the lower left of Vega.

The star is younger than the Sun, but it's also heavier, so it quickly converted the original hydrogen fuel in its core to helium, a process that will continue in the Sun for at least a few more weeks. Today, the core of Kepler 56 is quiet, with nuclear reactions taking place only in a thin shell around the core.

In response to that change, the outer layers are puffing outward, toward two planets. Both worlds are much closer to Kepler 56 than Mercury, the innermost planet in our own solar system, is to the Sun. And both are

quite large and puffy similar to the giants of our solar system. As Kepler 56 continues to evolve, its outer layers will ex-

pand even more. As the star's surface approaches the planets, their atmospheres will vaporize and stream off into space, leaving only their dense cores. Eventually, those bare chunks of rock and metal will fall into Kepler 56 and the two planets will die a fiery death and vanish from the universe.

Second, I have for you another Carl Sagan quote —"I would love to believe that when I die I will live again, that some thinking, feeling, remembering part of me will continue. But as much as I want to believe that, and despite the ancient and worldwide cultural traditions that assert an afterlife, I know of nothing to suggest that it is more than wishful thinking." Amen.

Finally, it is often overwhelming to look at the "billions upon billions" of stars overhead in our night sky. So much so that it's easy to overlook some of the stars so close by here on Earth. One is our very own Phil Vitale, Editor in Chief of our Birch Barker. For our enjoyment, Phil has been cranking out 13 - 15 weekly Birch Barkers per summer for the last 15 years. Additionally, there are the monthly on-line Barkers throughout fall, winter and spring. Phil has tirelessly, and without pay, designed, laid out, edited and solicited the content that we all enjoy and look forward to each week. Thanks to our star Phil for his hard work, his creativity and his tolerating my lateness for so many years.

Look for Phil in the east, near Tequila the Flamingo around 10:30 on Sunday mornings. He'll most likely be in The Pickle, (or still pickled), sail number 500, heading west toward the center of the lake. Though Phil's path may be largely unpredictable, he can most likely be spotted again in the east around two hours later.

Look for Cygnus, Vega, Deneb and the rest of the summer triangle in the east and overhead for a couple more months.

The show remains free.



of campers who attended. We didn't always love the cool weather (brrr!), but we sure did make a lot of great memories.


