



— Water Quality Report — Checking out the 'stuff' on the lake

ome of us are fortunate enough to wake up every morning looking out on the lake. With summer coming and the weather warming up, the lake can be sometimes perfectly calm. Thus, whatever is happening on the lake is more visible and not disrupted by wind and waves.

We mention this because occasionally you will see potentially large patches of "stuff" on the lake that does not have an appetizing appearance. However, in all likelihood what we are seeing is perfectly natural and will be dissipated with sun, a breeze, and even minimal wave action.

At this time of the late spring and early summer, the lake is the site of numerous insect hatches. Midges, mayflies, and other small creatures that grow and feed in the lake until they emerge to mate, lay eggs on the water for the next generation, and then die. I am not talking about the handful of dragonflies but the millions of mayflies. The skeletons from the larval stages from which they emerge stays in the water. These mix on the surface with all the tree seeds and pollen from the surrounding landscape providing a rich soup for the natural bacteria in the water. In hours the material can breakdown looking somewhat unpleasant and producing gas bubbles as part of the process of bacterial digestion. In the absence of the perfectly calm flat water at daybreak we would

never be aware of this. However, this is absolutely natural and part of the cycle of life on the lake.

Although not uncommon with the large hatches, it can also occur at other times during the summer. A number of times over the years in response to residents' concerns, Terry has tested samples of this material and no E Coli bacteria have been found, or only in numbers reflective of our population of water birds etc. There were lots of insect parts and pollen grains however.

These patches, maybe acres in size, are not to be confused with the richer, thick, and colored blue green algae blooms which may randomly occur close to a shoreline later in the summer, usually following a day when the breeze was blowing toward that shore. We have only had a few small algae bloom occurrences over the years which quickly went away.

As touched upon in last week's Barker, we will be talking more about shoreline development and maintenance this summer. As one aspect of that, we are planning to conduct a full lake shoreline survey as part of the CLMP program called "Score the Shore." In a few weeks we may ask for anyone who wishes to volunteer to assist in this (basically a long pontoon boat ride with lots of notes). To get an idea of what this may entail, you can do your own sort of score the shore. Go to www.mishorelandstewards.



org for some education and where you can do an online questionnaire related to your property. Although, you can grade your property, that is not the intent today, but rather developing awareness and helping to prepare for more discussion in this column as the summer proceeds.

A somewhat bothersome trend has already been occurring on the lake. As most of you are aware, the water clarity the last two years during the summer months has been poor to say the least. We have already conducted two secchi disk readings this year. On May 19 the visibility was down to 24 feet, but on May 26 it had already degraded to 14 feet. The water has a more greenish cast indicating algae growth which may explain some of the loss of clarity. We will continue to report on this during the summer.

Watch the evening sky for planets

hroughout this month, watch for three planets in the evening sky - Mars, Jupiter and Saturn. Look first for the king planet Jupiter, the brightest star-like object in the June evening sky. It beams quite high up at dusk and nightfall. From here at the lake, Jupiter appears in the southwest sky, in the constellation Serpico, at nightfall, and sets quite late after midnight.

From the lake, Mars and Saturn sit very low in the southeast at nightfall. Those on the east side might have to wait an hour or so after darkness falls before seeing these two worlds shining quite close together.

Fortunately, you have almost all night long to view Mars and Saturn, which travel westward across the night sky from dusk until dawn.

You can distinguish Mars from Saturn because Mars is, by far, the more brilliant of these two bright worlds just now. Mars ranks as the second-brightest starlike object to light up the evening sky.

Although you could possibly confuse the star Antares for Saturn, you can differentiate Saturn from Antares by color. Antares displays a bloody red hue while Saturn appears golden.

Best of all, Mars was closest to Earth for the year on May 30, and Saturn will be at its closest on June 3, so these two worlds will be especially bright in our evening sky this month.

The other two bright planets, Mercury and Venus, are nowhere to be found just now. In the Northern Hemisphere, Mercury sits low in the glare of twilight and is hard to spot in the morning sky.

In an ironic twist, Venus, the brightest planet of them all, is the only bright planet that can't be seen at all this month. Venus hides in the glare of the sun all month long. Its superior conjunction when it's on the far side of the sun from Earth for this orbit occurs on June 6. Venus will actually pass directly behind the sun during this particular superior conjunction, exactly four years after Venus swung directly in front of the sun's disk at inferior conjunction on June 6, 2012.


Venus is well known for its 8-year cycles. The sun last covered over (occulted) Venus at superior conjunction some 8 years ago, in 2008, and it will do so again some 8 years from now, in 2024. An occultation of Venus by the sun at superior conjunction happens much more frequently than a transit of Venus at inferior conjunction. The next transit of Venus won't happen until a while from now.

By the way, Venus has five superior conjunctions in a period of 8 years, and five inferior conjunctions in a period of 8 years. In other words, one complete cycle from superior (or inferior) conjunction to the following

superior (or inferior) conjunction lasts 1.6 years.

In the meantime, while Venus is absent from this summer's nighttime sky, look for three other planets - Jupiter, Mars and Saturn - as soon as darkness falls all month long.





It's duck itch season

wimmer's itch, also known as lake itch, duck itch, cercarial dermatitis, and Schistosome cercarial dermatitis, is a short-term, immune reaction occurring in the skin of humans that have been infected by water-borne schistosomatidae. Symptoms, which include itchy, raised papules, commonly occur within hours of infection and do not generally last more than a week.

A number of different flatworm parasites in the family Schistosomatidae are what cause swimmer's itch. These parasites use both freshwater snails and vertebrates as hosts in their parasitic life cycles. Mostly waterfowl are used as the vertebrate host. During one of their life stages, the larvae of the parasite, cercaria, leave the water snails and swim freely in the freshwater, attempting to encounter water birds. These larvae can accidentally come into contact with the skin of a swimmer. The cercaria penetrates the skin and dies in the skin immediately. The cercaria larvae cannot infect humans, but they cause an inflammatory immune reaction. This reaction causes initially mildly itchy spots on the skin. Within hours, these spots become raised papules which are intensely itchy. Each papule corresponds to the penetration site of a single parasite.

The schistosomatidae that give rise to swimmer's itch should not to be confused with those of the genus Schistosoma, which infect humans and cause the serious human disease schistosomiasis, or with larval stages of thimble jellyfish (Linuche unguiculata), which give rise to seabather's eruption. Seabather's eruption mostly occurs in salt water, on skin covered by clothing or hair, whereas swimmer's itch mostly occurs in freshwater, on uncovered skin.

Since it was first described in Michigan in 1928, swimmer's itch has been reported from around the world. Some suggest incidence may be on the rise, although this may also be attributed to better monitoring.

Children may become infected more frequently and more intensely than adults but this probably reflects their tendency to swim for longer periods inshore, where cercariae also concentrate.


To prevent it, don't stand around in shallow, warm lake water. Staying out in somewhat deeper water and/or keeping moving such as when swimming, will usually prevent the parasites from getting you. When you or the kids get out of the water, towel off immediately



with a strong rubbing motion and then shower with soap and hot water.

Swimmer's itch typically clears up on its own within a few days, though in some cases the rash can last up to a week. In the meantime, you can control itching with over-the-counter antihistamines or anti-itch creams, such as those that contain calamine lotion. If the itching is severe, your doctor may recommend a prescription medication.

Orally administered hydroxyzine, an antihistamine, is sometimes prescribed to treat swimmer's itch and similar dermal allergic reactions.



Sausage-stuffed squash

I make this at least once a week. It is truly a house favorite. Even the grandkids love it. Serving 2

Ingredients:

1 acorn squash, halved and seeded (cup the small tip off the bottom so it will set flat)

½ lb ground Italian sausage (you can substitute ground turkey)

- ¹/₂ cup finely chopped celery
- ¹/₂ cup finely chopped mushrooms
- ¹/₂ cup finely chopped mush oons ¹/₂ cup finely chopped crispy apple
- 1 tsp minced garlic
- ¹/₄ cup finely chopped onion
- 1 egg beaten
- ¹/₂ cup sour cream

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup grated Parmesan cheese Olive oil

Directions:

Sprinkle of Italian seasonings (basil, oregano, parsley)

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Grease a baking sheet or line with aluminum foil.

Rub the inside to the squash with olive oil and sprinkle with a little Italian seasoning.

Place squash, cut side down, on the prepared baking sheet.

Bake in the preheated oven until tender, about 1 hour. Flip squash halves over and set aside to cool. Heat large skillet over medium-high heat. Cook and stir sausage in the hot skillet until browned and crumbly. Drain and discard grease. Add celery, mushrooms, apples, onion and garlic. Stir until celery is slightly softened. Remove from heat.

Beat egg in a small bowl; stir in sour cream and Parmesan cheese. Stir cheese mixture into sausage mixture. Fill squash halves with sausage filling.

Bake in the preheated oven until filling is cooked through, about 20 minutes.

here at the lake for Memorial Day! It was so great to spend time down at the lake relaxing a bit before we kicked off training on Tuesday morning.

This week is our lifeguard and waterfront training all week. Staff members started arriving on Monday afternoon and evening, and by Tuesday morning we had 8 of our lifeguards here to get certified. Three of the new guards are international staff, coming from Mexico, England, and Spain! Plus we have staff from Florida, Ohio, Indiana, and Michigan here this week for waterfront training. It's quite a diverse group!

During this week of waterfront training we go through all of the skills and procedures that the waterfront staff will need to know. We test their swimming skills, practice emergency action plans, practice rescues and how to handle injuries. We also work on setting up the waterfront, bringing down all the boats and equipment, and getting everything in the proper places for campers to use. It's a long and exhausting week!

Later this week our new Assistant Camp Director will be arriving. Her name is Michelle Hartwig, and she is coming to Camp Tannadoonah for the first time. Miss Michelle has spent the past 11 years working at the Interlochen Arts Camp near Traverse City, MI. And for the past four years she has also worked at Interlochen during the school year, living in the dorms for their boarding school program. Prior to her position at Interlochen, Miss Michelle taught K-8 Music in Buckeye, Arizona, and in Flint, Michigan. She has a Bachelor's Degree in Music Education, and is currently working towards her Master's Degree in Camp Administration and Leadership. We are very excited to have Miss Michelle join our staff and bring her many years of experience in camping to Camp Tannadoonah!

This weekend we also have our leadership staff training program. We have three unit leaders, who are experienced counselors who serve as supervisors for other staff. The three unit leaders, the waterfront director, the assistant camp director, and the camp director all spend an extra two days of training planning for the rest of the staff to arrive. We plan out the staff training activities, work on cabin assignments, and discuss how we will handle feedback for staff throughout the summer.
