# — Water Quality Comments –

Just in case you have been wondering what your Water Quality Committee has been up to ...

We have done the spring phosphorous measurement, two monthly chlorophyll measurements, and five secchi disk measurements. The phosphorous and chlorophyll samples are currently in a freezer awaiting a June 21 turn in at the regional DEQ office in Plainwell. That data will not be available until in the winter.

Three more monthly chlorophyll samples will be taken (July, August, and September) as well as a late summer phosphorous sample. Secchi disk readings will be done weekly until mid September. Additionally, we have conducted two measurements of water temperature and dissolved oxygen (O2.) This is done by taking measurements every few feet throughout the entire 95 foot water column. We hope to do this at least 5 more times over the course of the summer to describe the development of a thermocline and change/loss in O2 levels at various depths. This latter measurement is a good indication of the health of the lake. We will discuss this in more detail later and provide graphs of what we are seeing in real time this year with comments about how this seems to compare to past years.

New this year, we will also be doing

a "Score the Shore" as mentioned in an earlier article. We may plan on this for later in July as it is not time dependent. This will also go along with further information on shoreline development, erosion protection, and naturalizing our shore where feasible to enhance the health of the lake.

Terry Dugan attended a four-hour program put on by Michigan State University extension service, the DEQ, and other sponsors regarding protecting and enhancing our shoreline. As stated previously, this will be a topic of discussion over the course of the summer to provide as much resource information as feasible for homeowners to be able to consider anything they might like to do on their property.

With reference to real time data on one of the measurements, we will continue to provide Secchi disk readings over the course of the summer. The disk is just that, a metal plate painted with alternating areas of black and white attached to a flexible measuring tape. The disk is lowered in the water hopefully on a sunny day on the shady side of the boat until the disk disappears. The disk is raised and lowered until an average distance is found where the disk disappears from view. As with all the measurements described above (except for Score the Shore) this is done at a rel-

atively defined spot which corresponds to the deepest spot on the lake. Thus, measurements taken last year and earlier years were all done at the same approximate



location. Secchi disk measurements were taken on May 19, 26, and 30, and June 10 and 13. The depths at which the disk disappeared were 24,14,16, 16, and 15 feet respectively. Last year over a similar time period the depths ranged from 30 feet to 20 feet. What will be most interesting to see will be the change from now until mid July at which point we usually have the most turbid water.

A quick survey of the lake for E coli will be conducted this week and hopefully reported in the July 4th Barker. Although, we have yet to find E coli above what would be expected as natural background we do this at least annually to ascertain and report on the safety of the water for all uses.

All of the above described activity is in addition to the survey and treatment of the lake for invasive plant species (typically Eurasian Milfoil.)





# 11 thins to learn about the June solstice

In many time zones in the Northern Hemisphere, June 20 was the longest day of the year. Here are 11 facts you are dying to know about the summer solstice.

#### 1. Summer & Winter Solstice

Here at the lake, where it is the longest day of the year in terms of daylight, the June Solstice is also called the Summer Solstice. In the Southern Hemisphere, on the other hand, it is the shortest day of the year and is known as the Winter Solstice.

#### 2. First Solstice of the Year

Solstices happen twice a year - in June and December. The June Solstice happens around June 21, when the Sun is directly over the Tropic of Cancer at 23.5 north latitude. The December Solstice takes place around December 21. On this day, the Sun is precisely over the Tropic of Capricorn, 23.5 south latitude.

### 3. When the Sun Seems to Stand Still

Solstice comes from the Latin words sol, meaning Sun and sistere, meaning to come to a stop or stand still. On the day of the June Solstice, the Sun reaches its northernmost position, as seen from the Earth. At that moment, its zenith does not move north or south as during most other days of the year, but it stands still at the Tropic of Cancer. It then reverses its direction and starts moving south again.

The opposite happens during the December Solstice. Then, the Sun reaches its southernmost position in the sky - Tropic of Capricorn - stands still, and then reverses its direction towards the north.

#### 4. It Occurs at the Same Time...

...all over the world. Technically, the June Solstice is the exact instant of time when the Sun is directly over the Tropic of Cancer. On Tuesday this happened at 22:34 IST. (LOL, IST, no such thing. We all know that.) Because of time zones differences though, this event took place on June 21 at locations that are more than 1 hour and 30 minutes ahead of UTC, the intelligently accepted time reference. (Cultural aside - Coordinated Universal Time (UTC) is the basis for civil time today. This 24-hour time standard is kept using highly precise atomic clocks combined with the Earth's rotation.)

### 5. It Can be on June 20, 21, or 22

Even though most people consider June 21 as the date of the June Solstice, it can happen anytime between June 20 and June 22. June 22 Solstices are rare - the last June 22 Solstice in UTC time took place in 1975 and there won't be another one until 2203.

#### 6. It's the First Day of Summer...

...depending on who you ask. Astronomers and scientists use the date of the June Solstice to mark the beginning of summer in the Northern Hemisphere and winter in the Southern Hemisphere. For meteorologists, on the other hand, summer began almost three weeks ago, on June 1. For many children, summer began on the last day of school.

## 7. The Earth is Farthest from the Sun

One might think that since it is summer in the Northern Hemisphere, the Earth is closest to the Sun during the June Solstice. But it's the opposite. You might recall that we've discussed this before. The Earth is actually farthest from the Sun during this time of the year. As I've told you time and time again, Earth's distance from the Sun has very little effect over the seasons on Earth. Instead, it's the tilt of Earth's rotational axis that creates seasons.

The direction of Earth's tilt does not change as the Earth or-

bits the Sun - the two hemispheres point towards the same direction in space at all times. What changes as the Earth orbits around the Sun is the position of the hemispheres in relation to the Sun - the Northern Hemisphere faces towards the Sun during the June Solstice, thus experiencing summer. The Southern Hemisphere tilts away



from the Sun and therefore enjoys (enjoys?) winter during this time.

Day length: 15h 13m

# 8. The Earliest Sunrise of the Year Doesn't Happen on the first day of summer.

Not going here. We've covered this countless times.

### 9. Not Usually the Hottest Day of the Year

In fact, the hottest days of the year for us at Birch Lake usually come a few weeks or sometimes months after the Solstice. This is because it takes time for the oceans and landmasses to warm up, which again allows for higher air temperatures.

# 10. The Arctic Circle has 24 Hours of Daylight

The June Solstice is the only day of the year when all locations inside the Arctic Circle experience a continuous period of daylight for 24 hours. Due to atmospheric refraction, however, the Midnight Sun is visible for a few days before and on the June Solstice from areas as far as 60 miles south of the Arctic Circle. As one moves further north of the Arctic Circle, the number of days with the Midnight Sun increases.

11. It's Celebrated Around the World

The June Solstice holds a special place of celebration in many cultures. People around the world celebrate the day with feasts, picnics, beer, dance, and music.

Get out there, watch the show and enjoy the summer. Not all of it's free, but some of it is.







#### Directions:


- 1. Place carrots in a shallow saucepan, and cover with water. Boil until tender. Drain, and return
