
thing such as our creatures of Birch Lake please find another hobby and leave Birch Lake intact, creatures and all.







# Water Quality Comments — Eurasian Milfoil

urasian Milfoil is an aggressive, tall growing exotic aquatic plant from Europe and Asia. It is capable of growing to the surface in 10 to 15 feet of water. At the surface it forms a dense canopy of vegetation over other plants. Many native plants may be reduced in abundance by the Milfoil canopy. It also conflicts with many recreational activities. In dense conditions it is a serious localized and lake wide problem. It is not a significant food crop for waterfowl, other birds or aquatic mammals. It readily regenerates from detached fragments and spreads rapidly. Consequently, this plant can form dense colonies covering much of a lake's shoreline out to a depth of about 20 feet.

Monday, May 23 Progressive AE surveyed Birch Lake for invasive aquatic vegetation species. Progressive AE has been surveying our lake since 2007. Every year they have surveyed the entire lake. This year one site was identified as having invasive species. The location is at the north end of the east shore where Eurasian Milfoil was identified along with Curly Leaf Pond Weed. Curly Leaf Pond Weed is not a concern because when the water temperature rises into the lower 70 range it will die. On the other hand the Milfoil was treated.

Professional Lake Management treated the site on June 7. They treated approximately 1-¼ acre. Progressive AE conducted a follow up inspection on June 23 and surveyed the entire lake. The survey did not reveal any other problem areas. However, the treatment on the east shore was not 100 percent successful. Professional Lake Management will return for a partial treatment on apor-





tion of the previously treated area. This year the Milfoil was especially hardy due to the mild winter.

This annual program is important in order to keep the Milfoil under control and to detect any other invasive species in the early stages to enable us to better control them. With your continued support we can maintain this important program and avoid having to deal with acres of invasive species like so many other lakes are currently dealing with. A good example of what can happen when Milfoil is not treated is Stone Lake in Cassopolis, which currently has approximately 67 acres of eurasian milfoil spread around nearly the entire shoreline.

### Explaining the phases of the moon

Have you ever wondered what causes the moon phases? We all know that its appearance changes over time. But why?

It's probably easiest to understand the moon cycle in this order: new moon and full moon, first quarter and third quarter, and the phases in between.

The new moon occurs when the moon is positioned between the earth and sun. The three objects are in approximate alignment (why "approximate" is explained below). The entire illuminated portion of the moon is on the back side of the moon, the half that we cannot see.

At a full moon, the earth, moon, and sun are again in approximate alignment, just as the new moon, but the moon is on the opposite side of the earth, so the entire sunlit part of the moon is facing us. The shadowed portion is entirely hidden from view.

The first quarter and third quarter moons (both often called a "half moon"), happen when the moon is at a 90 degree angle with respect to the earth and sun. So we are seeing exactly half of the moon illuminated and half in shadow.

Once you understand those four key moon phases, the phases between should be fairly easy to visualize.

An easy way to remember and understand those "between" lunar phase names is by breaking out and defining 4 words: crescent, gibbous, waxing, and waning. The word crescent refers to the phases where the moon is less than half illuminated. Gibbous refers to phases where the moon is more than half illuminated. The word waxing essentially means "growing" or expanding in illumination (unless you're Bob B.), and waning means "shrinking" or decreasing in illumination.

Thus you can simply combine the two words to create the phase name, as follows:

After the new moon, the sunlit portion is increasing, but less than half, so it is waxing crescent. After the first quarter, the sunlit portion is still increasing, but now it is more than half, so it is waxing gibbous. After the full moon, the light continually decreases. So the waning gibbous phase occurs next. Following the third quarter is the waning crescent, which wanes until the light is completely gone - a new moon.

#### The Moon's Orbit

The moon goes through a complete moon phases cycle in about one month. But it's not exactly one month. The synodic period, or lunation, is about 29.53 days. It's the time required for the moon to move to the same position (same phase) as seen by an observer on earth. If you were to view the moon cycling the earth from outside our solar system (the viewpoint of the stars), the time required is 27.3217 days, roughly two days less. This figure is called the sidereal period or orbital period. Why is the synodic period different from the sidereal period? The short answer is because on earth, we are viewing the moon from a moving platform: during the moon cycle, the earth has moved approximately one month along its year-long orbit around the sun, altering our angle of view with respect to the moon, and thus altering the phase. The earth's orbital direction is such that it lengthens the period for earthbound observers.

Although the synodic and sidereal periods are exact numbers, the moon phase can't be precisely calculated by simple division of days because the moon's motion (orbital speed and position) is affected by various forces of different strengths. Hence, complex equations, that only I and a few others can even begin to understand, are used to determine the exact position and phase of the moon at any given point in time.

So why, at a new moon, doesn't the moon block the sun, and at a full moon, why the doesn't Earth block sunlight from reaching the moon. The reason is because the moon's orbit about the earth

is about 5 degrees off from the earth-sun orbital plane.

However, at special times during the year, the earth, moon, and sun do in fact "line up". When the moon blocks the sun or a part of it, it's called a solar eclipse, and it can only happen during the new moon phase. When the earth casts a shadow on the moon, it's called a lunar eclipse, and can only happen during the full moon phase. Roughly 4 to 7 eclipses happen in any given year, but most of them are minor or "partial" eclipses. Major lunar or solar eclipses are relatively uncommon.

Go give your neighbor the moon. That's free, right?



# Camp Tannadoonah — **Super Hero week at Camp T**

't's Super Hero week here at Camp Tannadoonah! On Sunday evening we had Super Hero Training – a series of stations for campers to test their strength, balance, speed, agility, etc. We had a tug of war, a game of "sharks and minnows," and a game of "Go for the Gold." At crafts this week, the kids are making Super Hero capes and masks. Other evening activities include Super Kickball, and a Counselor "Villain Hunt." They also have Superman Ice Cream planned for one evening ... hopefully on a night when it's warmer than it is today as I'm writing this!

All the stormy weather last week led to a lot of questions about how we handle weather emergencies here at camp. During staff training, we spend time discussing procedures and what to do in different situations. Miss Michelle (my assistant director) and I each carry walkie talkies with built-in weather radios. Whenever there is a storm watch, we alert all of the counselors in camp, just to make sure they stay aware of what's going on. We have several different signals for severe weather, so if a counselor

doesn't hear the message over the radio, we also blow the air horn or ring the big bell outside Main Lodge to signal an emergency.

If a tornado warning is issued, or if the storm gets bad, we immediately bring all of the campers to two central locations: The Dining Hall and Morris Lodge. Both of these buildings have basements, so they are the safest places in camp to bring the kids. During the time we're waiting out the storm, we sing camp songs and play games to keep the kids calm. We monitor the weather radar and radios, and if it gets bad, we move the campers to the basements. We also do periodic drills with the counselors to make sure they stay sharp and remember all of the proper procedures for various emergency situations.

Last week we took all of the campers to the dining hall on Wednesday night when the storms came through - but luckily we were only there for a few hours, and didn't have to go to the basement because it never got really bad. Sunday afternoon this week we had to cancel the swim test because of thunder and lightning, which meant

we had to do a lot of creative rearranging of the schedule on Monday!

Our camper numbers continue to climb. We're currently at 888 campers for the summer! That's 41 more than we had last year at the end of the summer. Unfortunately, we don't have a lot of room to continue to grow this year. We're still hoping to get to 900 for the summer, but after the 4th of July, there are only 14 more beds available for the whole summer – and 13 of those spots are for boys! So we're pretty much at capacity for girls from here on out.

It's so exciting to see the numbers creep up closer and closer to 900! We're a long way off from the summer of 2006 when we had a grand total of 351 campers for the entire summer.

We're all looking forward to a little bit of a break next week for the 4th of July Holiday. Our international staff are excited to see what the holiday is like here in the states! We hope to see many of you here for the pancake breakfast on Sunday morning! Have a wonderful holiday weekend. Until next week,
