

Birch Lakers participate in Diamond Lake Regatta



— Water Quality Report —

ater Testing – E coli:
For the past 12 years or so,
we have conducted testing for the
bacteria E coli in Birch Lake. The impetus for testing was post-sewer related, and
does not need to be rehashed at this time.
Nonetheless, after a summer of weekly testing by an outside agency, it was
determined that E coli was not present at
any level that would be of concern to our
recreational use of the lake.

It should be noted and remembered that E coli is a type of coliform bacteria that is present in the intestinal tracts all warm blooded animals as a normal component of the intestinal flora, and finds its way into the environment via fecal contamination. Thus, E coli has become an indicator bacteria for whether a body of water was safe for recreational use due to fecal contamination. E coli normally does not cause issues or is pathogenic, however, increased levels are an indicator of greater fecal contamination and the potential for either pathogenic (disease causing) forms of E coli or other fecal bacteria. It would be difficult to find a body of water without some small background level of E coli as we have ducks, geese, muskrats, herons, dog poop washed into the lake post storm, and maybe the unintended dirty diaper of a small child. The biggest concern is sewage from storm systems that combine storm and sewage in same

pipes after a big rain, or from large flocks of geese on a beach. These situations may lead to high levels of E coli counts making temporary shutdowns of swim areas necessary. Our sewer system is not affected by storms, and as a negative pressure system, would not be expected to leak, thus not providing a source of contamination into the lake. Based on all the results from the past 12 years, any E coli found are expected to be from our local wildlife and at levels that are well below the DNR/EGLE recommended safe levels.

Testing is conducted using all sterile materials for collection and analysis and obtained from a laboratory in Goshen. Samples are taken in approximately a meter of water from a kayak, thus not disturbing the lake bottom. Samples have been taken from the same locations each year, and reflect the basic testing strategy taken by the outside agency. Once samples are brought in, using sterile technique, they are mixed with an agar media, poured into prepared petri dishes, and then incubated at 95 degrees for two days. Usually, numerous colonies of bacteria will grow but E coli colonies will produce a blue color identifying them.

The only sampling site with E coli levels that might be of concern is the little inlet stream on the northeast part of the lake. Here, within the stream levels are above recommended safe levels for swim-



ming, but within a couple of feet from the inlet, we are back to only background levels. Additionally, genetic analysis has shown the bacteria in the stream are not of human origin and thus not from the sewer. Sampling from this year has been no different from past years with E coli counts less than 10-20 percent of the recommended safe levels.

Addenda — With the talk of bacteria in this time of sterilization for all things Covid (virus), it should be noted that each of you have about 70 trillion bacteria either on the surface of your skin or within your intestinal tract. In fact, we keep trying to add more with yogurt, probiotics, etc. A well balanced bacterial floral population is good for your health...





Birch Lake History -

Scannell Cottage at Birch Lake

Eighty years ago a pandemic was raging, touching all ages - but especially children. Polio was a crippling disease that seemed to spread quicker in warmer weather. Many believed it spread through swimming pools and lakes. But John Scannell didn't believe it.

Having rented the Eichorst cottage in 1939 and 1940, John and Lois believed Birch Lake was the cleanest lake around and the best place for the family to be during the summer to keep them safe from polio. The lot next to Eichorst's was purchased in 1940 and the little summer cottage #74, on the southside of the lake, was ready. John, Patricia and Bob, the Scannells" three children, made friends and enjoyed their summers on Birch Lake.

John Scannell was the Chairman of the Physical Education Department at Notre Dame, hired by Knute Rockne. Soon after, the beloved coach was tragically killed. John oversaw the building of the Rockne Building on campus, where his office was located. Lois was a mom, dance teacher, and later in life, an artist. She taught painting through the YMCA in South Bend and encouraged many to take part in artistic endeavors.

Every morning, John would head to South Bend to work and the moms and kids would walk around the lake- at the lakeshore. There were some years when the polio rates were so bad, schools did not open until October, making for a very long summer. One day when the kids complained of being bored, it was suggested that they start a newspaper. The Scannells and their friends would traipse around the lake gleaning interesting information to put in their paper. And that is how the Birch Barker began. As they got older, all three worked in some capacity at Camp Eberhardt.





After the kids had grown, the next generations would gather at the family cottage with their kids. John's family landed in Utah, Pat's in Kalamazoo, and Bob's in State College, Pennsylvania. Bob's memories of those visits were about scraping and painting the cottage. But his kids remember their time with their cousins.



John passed away in 1973 and Lois considered selling the cottage. Pat and her husband, Dave Hogoboom, convinced her to keep it and they were able to rent it out enough to cover expenses. In $2002,\, both\, Lois$ and Dave passed away within days of each other. Young John had passed away from cancer in the late 1980's. Bob made sure the Hogobooms would be able to keep the cottage. Pat's son, Dave, and his wife, Donna, have been the caretakers ever since.

The cottage hasn't changed much in 80 years. Hot water and a shower were added in the late 1980's. Soon after a telephone was installed. A large deck was added to the lakeside in the late 1990's. Most recently new siding was put on (no more scraping and painting!) and new windows, which should help to insure the cottage will make it to the 100 year mark.

Bob passed away a few years ago, but Pat can still be found sitting in her shady corner of the deck or occasionally driving her new pontoon. The Scannells and Hogobooms gather every year at little #74 on Birch Lake for a big ScaBoom reunion. A tradition we hope to continue for years to come.

The large group is the family reunion group from Saturday. The 3 boys, Andrew Hogoboom, Atlas, and Clay Boverhof defending Birch Lakeshore Drive. They are the great-grandsons of Patricia Scannell Hogoboom. The other is four generations at Birch Lake: Patricia, Dave, Joe, Andrew, and Madi (the newest member of the family) Hogoboom.

— Camp Tannadoonah –

t's hard to believe that we're just about to start August. We're getting close to the end of summer, and starting to look ahead to fall and winter here at camp. In fact, we're launching registration for our after school programs today.

We run two after school programs for Camp Fire, one at Good Shepherd Montessori School in South Bend, and one at Sam Adams Elementary in Cassopolis. We're hoping to start a 3rd program in the next year or so. Our After School Programs Director is Miss Gabby, who serves as our CIT (counselor in training) director during the summer months. Miss Gabby was a camper and CIT at Tannadoonah, then a member of our camp staff, and last summer was the assistant camp director.

During the school year, we have after school at our two sites every afternoon from the end of the school day until 6pm. We provide a snack, homework help, enrichment activities, and outdoor time. We also offer all day programs on scheduled days off of school. We have a site supervisor and a program assistant at each location.

In Camp Fire, we use a programming framework called Thrive{ology} to map out all of our programs. There are main four components to this framework: (1) helping kid find their Sparks (passions or things they get excited

about); (2) teaching kids goal management skills (setting goals, readjusting plans when you get off track); (3) growth mindset (you can improve with hard work, you may not be good at it *yet,* but you can get better if you keep working on it); and (4) reflection (evaluating experiences and thinking about how you could do it differently or improve in the future).

Miss Gabby writes a curriculum for each of the programs that uses the Thrive framework. We have a different "Big Picture" theme every 6 weeks. These themes are "indicators of thriving" from the Thrive Framework, and might include things like Making Connections, Confidence, Resilience, Communication. And then each day of the week has its own focus. Mondays are "Camp Fire Trails" - traditional Camp Fire activities. Tuesdays are STEM (science, technology, engineering, or math). Wednesday's focus is on the arts. Thursdays are Project Based Learning days – the kids develop a project they want to work on, and everything Thursday they continue their efforts on that project. And Fridays are outdoors or environmental program-

We also start every day with something we call "Spark Time." This is based on a program called Conscious Discipline, and has four pieces: Unite, Destress, Connect, Commit. It begins



with a camp song to get everyone focused (unite). Then they do a breathing or stretching exercise (destress). Then a short, fun team building activity to create connection among the group – sharing something about themselves, or developing trust (connect). And then they make a commitment. Usually this takes the form of saying "today I commit to being nice to my brother," or "my commitment is to get all my homework done before bed." They can also just give a thumbs up to show that they've made their commitment but don't have to say it out loud to the group.

We have a lot of fun with our After School kids throughout the year, and many of them end up coming to camp in the summer, too!


