
### 2022 Dues, fireworks donations

# — Water Quality Report —

### What we do, updates, boat wake study

ach year we provide information to the lake community through written articles in the weekly printed Birch Barker. The first edition, which this is, provides an opportunity to review what we do, give an update on all the water quality parameters we tested for in the past year, and try to provide some perspective on what we will be talking to you about during this summer season. In addition, in this article, we will point lake residents toward an actual university-designed and conducted study on wake boats. The intent here is not to provide a judgment on the presence or use of these boats but to permit residents to actually read and evaluate real data and information along with further study plans that will evaluate actual effects that may result depending on the use of these boats.

First, what we do. We participate through Michigan Lakes and Streams, a statewide organization, in the MiCorps water quality monitoring program. The usual testing that we conduct is for a primary limiting nutrient, phosphorous, and what might be seen as downstream deleterious effects of changes in this nutrient, i.e. algal growth, lake transparency, and loss of oxygen during the season through the water column. We do sampling at the deepest part of the lake for all these parameters. A spring and late summer phosphorous sample is taken, monthly samples for chlorophyll a, monthly testing for oxygen and temperature from the surface to almost 100 feet down, and basically weekly transparency reading (measured with a secchi disc). No testing was done in 2020 (Covid and funding), so the last prior data was for 2019. To see the recently released data for 2021, please go to mymlsa.org. At the very top of the home page, click on MiCorps. Then click on lakes, then individual lake reports, Cass County, and finally Birch Lake 140187. This will provide the full summary and analysis of the testing which was done. In comparison to 2019, the data slightly trended in the

wrong direction, but a statement regarding that will depend on a few more years of data. A summary statement from MiCorps states that nutrient levels basically have remained unchanged since monitoring began. Basically, we are modestly productive oligotrophic lake with some mesotrophic characteristics. This is a good spot for a small southwest Michigan lake.

In addition we contract with a consulting and treatment firms for the evaluation and presence of invasive species in the lake and for appropriate treatment if necessary on an annual basis. You will probably see more on this when the surveys are conducted and potential treatments planned. Watch for this in upcoming barkers.

Additionally, we have in the past participated in other MLSA programs such as Score the Shore, plant identification and distribution etc. We have copies of a publication on shorelines that were made available at the spring dinner and we will put out at upcoming events. Only able to get 100 so look for these at upcoming events. Terry Dugan can also make some available. Just text him at 269-832-5588. Also, each year, Terry does a survey for Ecoli levels in the lake so as to reassure the residents that the lake is safe for all the water activities we enjoy. We have never seen anywhere near levels beyond background.

Next, as there has been some concern about the potential effects of high energy waves from the new wakeboats, especially in the smaller lakes like Birch, MLSA has been active in reporting on real and anecdotal information, and participating in discussions with manufacturers and state agencies. Now we have a well-designed formal study conducted by the University of Minnesota, that looked at the actual physics of the boat/lake interaction. Of considerable interest, it was done as a comparison under identical conditions between normal ski/tube boats operating at usual conditions and wake/surf boats. We will not attempt to describe everything here



but will direct you to the study. This again can be found at mymlsa.org. Click on news and scroll down to the February 1 report on the boat study. When you pull this up there will be introductory information and then links at the bottom to four pieces of information. We would suggest definitely reading the items under the Healthy Waters Initiative Website, as it encapsulates the study designs in a nutshell. Also, read the news release, as it provides a good short description of the study and the findings. For those interested, the full report is highly detailed and has lots of great information but some physics and equations that may be a bit daunting, but with a beer and your feet up, it is a good read. At the end of the day, a goal will be to provide suggestions on how best this form of activity might be used on Birch Lake. Followup studies will be intended to show whether and what kind of shoreline erosion/damage might result from the inappropriate (to be defined) use of this boating activity. It is hoped the followup study, which is now underway, will make recommendations on which speeds, distances from shore and lake depths are optimal for these boats.

Finally, and with great excitement we announce a new member to the committee, Jennifer Ball. If others are interested, please let us know as age is beginning to dictate a, shall we say, retiring state of mind for some of us.







# **Blast from the Past**

Dam Memories

Just off the beaten path on the south side where the water winds its way back to the mill pond, is the Birch Lake Dam. We all remember it as the place, during our walks around the lake, we had to decide just how we'd cross its roughly twelve-foot expanse. Would we "sit-crawl" sideways, "tightrope walk" one foot in front of the other across its narrow cast-iron top, or wade through the shallow water while someone held a flashlight aloft to illuminate our path? Whatever the method of crossing, the dam was always there aballogically just a bit on those dark current picks. e, challenging us just a bit on those dark summer

there, challenging us just a bit on those dark summer night outings.

The dam's builder, with his inventive mind and his love for children probably envisioned all those feet walking across his creation. We who were privileged to know him believe he would have loved providing such fun for so many while also serving the purpose of freshwater fish conservation. This remarkable man was my grandfather, Frank Foote. By trade he was a tool engineer who owned the Martin Machine Company located on West Indiana Avenue in South Bend. He was also an inventor, amateur photographer with a home darkroom, filmmaker, and devoted conservationist. By bringing us, as children, to this place that he loved, he began a family pilgrimage to Birch Lake. Its unique beauty infected us. We keep returning. Some of us live here. Among the lake's current residents are two granddaughters, Sally Everett-Beck, and Sue Wagner, and great granddaughters, Amy Everett and Melanie Hall. My brother and I visit with our children. They easily sense everything that is special about this lake. I think they, to would all live here if their lives hadn't taken them to such far off places.

On the south side of the lake is the cottage, now owned by Claude Petit, which Frank Foote built in 1939 when he was fifty-eight years old. He not only designed the house and its unique features, but did most of the work himself. In the knotty pine living room he built a magnificent stone fireplace which rises two stories tall to meet a cathedral ceiling. He had the large stones hauled in from a farmer's field, and flanked the fireplace on each side with wood boxes. Each had iron doors in the back which opened to the outdoors for convenient loading. The staircase, with its carved pine railings has a balcony that overlooks this room. My grandmother, with her passion for antiques, found a cranberry glass Tiffany lamp which she treasured. It hung suspended from the very top on a long chain in the middle of this room. The focal point in the kitchen was the curved wooden banquette with its round table.

He installed a furnace, and, across the road, built a garage and screened summer house. He intended to someday live there year-round, but just never got around to it. Later on, he bought a full sized red tractor which he kept in that garage and farmed a sizable five-acre meadow at the top of a hill which ran up through the woods. He grew peas, new potatoes, strawberries, and green beans and, like all

new potatoes, strawberries, and green beans and, like all his other pursuits, loved doing that, too. When more of us grandchildren arrived, he hitched a wooden platform to the back of the tractor to haul all sorts of things plus any kids that cared to ride along. It was great fun and a little scary traveling up and down some of those steep hills behind that chugging farm machine.

My grandfather didn't get through all that home

building unscathed. He fell from a ladder while working on the second floor. He was then put on a board, carried to the car, where he was put in the trunk, and, in that fashion, transported to Memorial Hospital in South Bend. His granddaughter, Beverly Foote joined him in the trunk to keep an eye on him for the duration of the trip. The fall resulted in a broken back and he spent the next two months at home in a hospital bed.

A charter member of the Izaak Walton League, he believed in and lived its creed, receiving a commendation from President Franklin Roosevelt for his lifetime efforts in conservation. He loved fly fishing and ice fishing and constantly sought ways to preserve Birch Lake as a good place to do both. He designed special spears and floodlights to keep the gar population in check, and made hinged, triangular metal mooring arms to fasten boats to docks. He owned one of the first snipe sailboats on the lake, acting as sailing teacher for his granddaughter

The evolution of the dam was a three-step process: zion, manufacture, and installation. The first two were creation, manufacture, and installation. done by Frank Foote when he came up with the idea; drew the plans, then implemented them in his machine shop. In the plans, then implemented them in his machine shop. In the third step, he was joined by his friend, neighbor, and fellow fisherman, Clarke Zesinger, Bud's father. Together, the two men installed the cast-iron structure called a weir dam. Really, a type of fish gate with rake-like projections at the bottom, its purpose was to prevent fish from leaving the lake and traveling to the mill pond and from there

Shavehead Lake. To this day, some fifty years later, it still serves Birch Lake well. Both men would be proud of their enduring work. Their contribution will always be part of Birch Lake.

Maybe some of the old traditions endure, also. were always plenty of kids of all ages. are still the same: Machallecks, Julie Ebling Weaver, Zesingers, Doolittles, Haynes, Jensens, Weesners, Horvaths, Troegers. The Kessler family, no longer there, lived in the cottage that would become John and Arlene Machalleck's. Ruth Kessler, the daughter, was a nurse who taught swimming to many of the kids.

Nightly forays around the lake always resulted in a group which grew larger and larger as it picked up additional members along the way. In those days, Lazy Lodge had a little general store, and we stopped and bought everything from candy to "contraband" cigarettes (meaning our parents didn't know and wouldn't have approved). Tales of wild cougars kept us on our toes, and once in a while you'd hear one cry out. It sounded exactly like a woman's high-pitched scream, and was just frightening enough to make everyone quicken their pace. There was also the "live wire" rumor. Where that got started, no one knew, but everyone believed it, and, if you listened hard enough, you could hear its eerie whine. Naturally, someone always had to sneak up the wooden steps at Tannadoonah and ring the camp's bell. The perpetrator would then come flying back down the stairs, a counselor hot on his heels. By now, the rest of us were hiding behind trees listening to the voice of camp authority as it yelled out warnings into the pitch darkness. There were lots of water games, too. Bud Zesinger and Jay Walters would ride, two on a bike, straight off the end of Zesinger's long pier. It was a great trick and one I admired, but was always too afraid to try. Then, there were the games: Kick the can, Run Sheep Run, and Manhunt. Those lake roads must still echo with the sounds, of a voice yelling, "ollie, ollie in free."

Maybe, today, some of these things still take place. I hope so. They were a vital part of Birch Lake, just as my grandfather was. Nightly forays around the lake always resulted in a

### Ingredients:

6 - 10 bone-in chicken pieces

- 4 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 tablespoons sweet paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika or ground cayenne 1 tablespoon curry powder
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 teaspoon minced fresh rosemary or dried rosemary (I used fresh)
- 1 teaspoon ketchup
- 1 teaspoon honey




### Directions:

ere comes summer! By the time this Barker lands in your driveway, part of our camp staff will have already arrived at Camp T! The rest of the staff will arrive on Sunday to kick off two weeks of training before campers arrive.

We've had a very busy spring here at camp. We have a 5-member AmeriCorps National Civilian Community Corps (NCCC) team at camp for six weeks. They have been helping us clean cabins, repair window screens and shutters, assemble furniture, clear trails, and lead groups at camp. They will be at camp until June 21, when they move on to their 3rd of four projects that they will work on as part of their 10-month service commitment to AmeriCorps.

We have several camp counselor, kitchen crew, and program staff positions (ages 16+), as well as the very important Kitchen Manager position still open. 

# FOR EMERGENCY USE ONLY ALARM WILL SOUND



There are six (6) automated external defibrillator units on Birch Lake. The boxes that contain these devices are located at the following locations (see map):

- 1. West Shore, Sheffieck home, 62875 Birch Lakeview Dr.
- 2. North Shore, Smitley home, 14859 Birch Northshore Dr.15046
- 3. East Shore, Vitale home, 63174 Birch Rd.
- 4. South Shore, Eberhart home, 15046 Birch Lakeshore Dr.
- South/East Shore, Troeger home, 63696 Birch Rd.
- 6. Southwest Shore, DeYoung home, 63255 Storey Hill St.

All units are on the ROAD SIDE of the property and accessible by vehicle or on foot.

### IN AN EMERGENCY:

- 1. CALL 911 and report the emergency and the patient's location immediately.
- 2. Pull the box open, remove the orange-colored unit, TAKE IT TO THE PATIENT and open the device by pressing the white lever at the bottom.
- 3. An automated voice will guide you through the setup and use of the defibrillator. Follow the instructions as they are given.
- 4. Continue to follow the instructions as given, and stay with the patient until help arrives.
