As always I close with a nod to my father Joe's (Commodore BLYC 1975) thoughts, "May the memories remain and the view stay the same" on our Golden Pond.




Feel free to bring a bottle of vino to round out your dining experience. Carry-out will be available.



The state of the lake Part 2

State of the Lake: Part 2

Last week in the Barker we reported on the Cooperative Lake Monitoring Programs (CLMP) summary regarding the testing that had been conducted at Birch Lake by Jennifer Ball during the summer of 2023. This included transparency by Secchi Disk, spring and summer phosphorous levels, chlorophyll-a concentrations, and dissolved oxygen/temperature profiles over the course of the season.

The conclusion from CLMP was that we are a mesotrophic/oligotrophic lake. An oligotrophic lake is nutrient-poor, with few plants and very clear water. Eutrophic lakes are highly productive, with lots of plants and/or algae and have less clear water. Mesotrophic lakes are in-between.

Over the course of several years at Birch Lake there has been little change beyond minor year to year variations. Nonetheless, the 2022 trophic status (the total weight of biomass in a given body of water at the time of measurement) was above what we have been seeing and created some concern about a future trend.

Of note was the rise in the summer phosphorous in 2022, which has now been seen in 2023. Increased phosphorous normally means an increase in productivity in the lake. Thus, at the end of the summer in 2023, we decided to add some additional testing from Progressive AE to confirm or contrast what we might see from the 2023 CLMP report, and to look at a couple of additional parameters. The report from Progressive AE on their late summer testing is attached as an addendum. The time frame of the testing aligns with the last testing that was conducted for the CLMP report.

The Progressive AE report differs

from the CLMP report on the level of chlorophyll-a. Their test indicated a much lower concentration. However, the late summer phosphorous was quite similar and of concern. Progressive added a couple of additional data points, namely pH and alkalinity. pH refers to the acidity or basic level of the lake. Our own bodies operate at about a pH of 7.4 and most biological life exists in a range of 6-9. A pH of 8 or so is of no concern in our lake and, in fact, provides for the ability of our flora and fauna to flourish.

The term "alkalinity" is important. This refers to the ability of a body of water to buffer the effects of influxes like acid and acid rain. We are a carbonate rich lake due to springs that bring in water which percolates through limestone deposits. This makes the lake protective from any acid influx but keeps it in the more basic pH range. In addition to the data provided, the Progressive AE report is quite educational and clearly defines each of the testing parameters and their utility. Please read and keep a copy for future reference.

As noted above, both the CLMP and Progressive AE report define Birch Lake's trophic status as mesotrophic/ oligotrophic. This designation is not a negative. It means basically that Birch is a quality lake with modest productivity. Birch Lake is a wonderful fishery; deep, cold and with a good oxygen level (making it ideal for trout and other cold water stocking programs) and we hope that continues. What we do not want is for productivity to increase and push us toward a more mesotrophic leaning, especially with any speed. Maybe in a few hundred years or more but not in the ensuing decades.

So, what might be the causes or



reasons for the increases in late summer phosphorus? First, we are in a steep basin. That means when we get heavy rains, runoff is rapid. Secondly, we have a hardscaped perimeter. Houses of increasing size, concrete driveways, patios, roads etc. Thus, there is less forest, grass, garden, etc. to absorb the rain. meaning more stuff around the lake will get into the lake. Thus, please ensure that if you are using fertilizer, use a non-phosphorous fertilizer. Thirdly, our shoreline is not lined with lots of natural vegetation providing a buffer between the land and the lake. Lastly, our recreational activities could stir up the bottom from prop wash and wave action helping to suspend phosphorous from the sediment into the water column.

Keep the recommendations in mind for wake boats (15-foot minimum depth and 500 feet from the shoreline) and all other activities such as skiing or tubing. Remember, we're all stakeholders in this beautiful lake. It's on us to keep it that way

EMERGENCY HEART DEFIBRILLATOR (AED) locations on Birch Lake

There are six (6) automated external defibrillator units on Birch Lake. The boxes that contain these devices are located at the following locations (see map):

- 1. West Shore, Sheffieck home, 62875 Birch Lakeview Dr.
- 2. North Shore, Smitley home, 14859 Birch Northshore Dr.15046
- 3. East Shore, Vitale home, 63174 Birch Rd.
- 4. South Shore, Eberhart home, 15046 Birch Lakeshore Dr.
- 5. South/East Shore, Troeger home, 63696 Birch Rd.
- 6. Southwest Shore, DeYoung home, 63255 Storey Hill St.

All units are on the ROAD SIDE of the property and accessible by vehicle or on foot.

IN AN EMERGENCY:

- 1. CALL 911 and report the emergency and the patient's location immediately.
- 2. Pull the box open, remove the orange-colored unit, TAKE IT TO THE PATIENT and open the device by pressing the white lever at the bottom.
- 3. An automated voice will guide you through the setup and use of the defibrillator. Follow the instructions as they are given.
- 4. Continue to follow the instructions as given, and stay with the patient until help arrives.

— Birch Lake Memories —

History of Williamsville The first 100 years, 1828-1928

f you've traveled the roads surrounding Birch Lake, your thoughts may wonder to what is Williams-ville. The tiny village on the southwest corner of Birch Lake was once an integral part of Birch Lake commerce.

The first families settled in 1828-29, Nathan Williams, John White, and John East. In 1848 the town of Williamsville was laid out by Joshua Williams, son of Nathan. The first store and gristmill were built at that time.

The underground railroad ran through this section of Southwest Michigan ending near Cassopolis. The first sawmill with a water wheel was erected in the '50s, and the first school was built at that time. A second sawmill was envisioned but never finished as the surveyed railroad connecting White Pigeon, Constantine, Williamsville and on to Saint Joe, Michigan, never materialized. From Constantine, the rail turned and headed to Chicago instead.

The 1870s and '80s saw great expansion of the village with the grocery store, feed barn and livery, wagon shop, and a physicians office with a barbershop situated in the office's hallway. With a population around 300 the town welcomed a second physician, blacksmith shop, cabinet and print shop, and general store. The '90s brought a telephone pay station and rural mail delivery in 1902.

It is recorded that much of the village's entertainment and socialization centered around music. The "McKinley Liberty Poll" with a team of gray and cream mules circled the pole to the tune of "Mule, Mule Song," composed by local resident Moses Garner. A band of nine instruments was organized with three harmonicas, three banjos, and three guitars, and they played at village get-togethers. It was said that Clarence East, the leader of the band, was the best harmonica player in the United States! The band had the honor of playing for CG Conn (Conn Instrument Co. of Elkhart) at his Shavehead Lake cottage on several occasions.

The women's Birch Lake Embroidery Club was organized in 1904 and a sociability "Grange" was organized in 1907 with a membership of 40 residents.

Next week, the second hundred, years 1920s to present.


The Moon this Saturday

Sun and Moon this Week



— Camp Tannadoonah —

ow, what a hot week here at camp! Thank goodness we have the cool waters of Birch Lake to help cool everyone off. With temperatures over 90 every day this week (and heat indexes even higher), our staff had to be extra vigilant watching campers for signs of heat-related illnesses. We train most of our staff in first aid during staff training, so they are aware of the symptoms of heat cramps, heat exhaustion, and heat stroke.

We sent an email on Monday to all of the camper parents, letting them know what measures we were taking to keep their campers safe during the heat wave. Some of the things we do include requiring everyone to drink at least one cup of water at each meal before they can have any other beverages, taking more frequent breaks from activities, reminding campers and staff to carry their water bottle with them everywhere, encouraging campers and staff to keep a cool wet bandanna or towel around their neck, setting up sprinkler stations, and requiring everyone to go to the lake during our open swim time.

We also have air conditioning for the Welcome Center and the Health Center, so we have two spaces in camp we can use to cool down if people are getting overheated. Our kitchen staff often find frequent reasons to go get things out of the walk in cooler on days like this! We also try to plan water-oriented evening activities on hot nights — things like water relays at the lake, or "sponge wars" on the sports field.

I've noticed when I'm driving back to

the lake from town that the temperature drops around 5 degrees as I get closer to the lake – sometimes more! Getting away from the parking lots and buildings and roads in town, and having lots of shade definitely helps keep us cooler out here at camp.

Sue's articles about Birch Lake history inspired me to include a little camp history in my Barker articles this summer. Back in 2020 I did a lot of history research because we were coming up on our 100th anniversary at camp. I found this news clipping from 1931, published in the Niles Daily Star, about a guest of the Sears Family who was injured in a fall while visiting their home at Birch Lake. The doctor mentioned in the article, Dr. Ersom Mills Cunningham, was the owner of the first piece property that Camp Fire purchased on Birch Lake in 1930. It is a nine-acre parcel that contained all of our waterfront



frontage, Main Lodge, and what is now the Camp store and handcraft building.

Dr. Cunningham and his wife lived in what we call Main Lodge, and had 6 children (5 girls and one boy). The oldest three daughters were Katherine, Margaret, and Dorothy, and their family called the house "KathMarDo Lodge" because of the girls' names. One of the younger daughters, Mary, was born in 1912 in that house. Her married name was Mary Deitle, and she lived to be 102 years old. In 2011 she visited Camp with her daughters, and told us stories about growing up in Main Lodge with her family. They sold the property to Camp Fire when she was 18.

We're coming up on the Pancake Breakfast here at camp, and we're looking forward to seeing many lake residents and guests! This year's breakfast is Sunday, July 7, from 8:30-11 am. The cost is \$5 for ages 13 and older, \$3 for youth ages 5-12, and free for ages 0-4. We can always use helpers at the breakfast, too! If you're interested in volunteering for a shift, please email me at amber@riverbendcampfire.org.




