





WATER QUALITY REPORT

STATE OF THE LAKE

ast week, the chair of the lake's Water Quality Committee, Patrick Welch, provided the first article for the season. We will probably have an article each week discussing an array of topics hopefully of relevance to the lake community ranging from invasive species to funding of the committee's activities. Each article will be written by a different member of the committee and invited guests. Pat provided an overview last week, and future articles will be reflective of what he outlined.

The author this week is Terry Dugan. What I would like to do today is three things, (1) introduce you to the members of the committee, (2) give a brief overview via the CLMP report on the State of the Lake, (3) and provide some information on a few observations from the spring and some testing that was conducted post Barker articles last season.

Currently there are 9 members of the committee. Our chair is Patrick Welch from the south side. Paul Fallon of the east side is chair emeritus. Jennifer Ball is our water tester now, along with assistance from her husband John. Rick Russwurm works with our outside contractors for surveying the lake for invasive species and establishing treatment for such (right now only treating for Eurasian milfoil).

Cindy Bernaciak has picked up the mantle from Bruce Wagner on surveying and removing the invasive shoreline plant, purple loosestrife, and will do so with Tom Kuhn, a new member of our committee. Zach Nickell is keeping up with the flow of information on the effect of wake/bladder boats on lakes, and as an owner of one, will provide information on best practices on the use of these boats.

Ron Niezgodski has been involved with other lake/stream management groups in southwest Michigan and will



also help with the management of purple loosestrife.

We participate in the Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program (CLMP) through Michigan Lakes and Streams. There are a number of testing parameters we can participate in but the standard ones each year are water clarity (Secchi Disk readings on a weekly basis), spring and summer phosphorous measurements, monthly chlorophyll measurements, and at least monthly dissolved oxygen and temperature readings throughout the water column from the surface to the 95 foot level.

The readings from each of these are interrelated but become combined into a scoring system referred to as the Trophic Status Index. Of importance, is doing this year after year, so one can spot trends indicating potential issues with the lake. We have included the Cooperative Lakes Monitoring report on Birch Lake, looking at each testing parameter, changes over the years, and the overall Trophic Status Indicator numbers (TSI). The overall summary provides sort of a weak basically no change status for Birch Lake.

In a later article we will provide more commentary on the state of the lake. It will be important for us to continue monitoring all of these factors on an annual basis. Change in lake status is a function of our collective behavior, i.e., not using phosphorous containing fertilizers, maintain some buffer between lawn and lake to prevent runoff from yards and road directly into the lake, and other factors we will be discussing this season.

Two other notes:

- There has been some buzz about a discoloration in the lake a few weeks ago and a bit of an algae bloom more recently. The algae bloom can sort of be expected but at different levels yearly based on temperature and sunlight with the advent of spring. This one was a temporary bloom of the colonial algae Spirogyra. Instead of algae as single floating cells these link into strands so you end up with long threads. Just like threads or string not on a spool you end up with a messy ball of algal threads. If you handle one you will find it feels greasy. Not toxic like blue green algae, and it is basically disappearing as we speak. The discoloration, we believe, is a rush of heavily ironcontaining water from seeps and springs near the camp. It came and
- Ecoli. At the end of summer in 2024, I sampled for E coli at six locations around the lake. Effectively no sign other than the occasional colony with the exception of the little stream at the northeast part of the lake. However, once diluted into the lake no problem. There will always be some background E coli as it is a fecal product from warm blooded animals, geese, swans, dog poop, muskrats etc. E coli is only an issue when it reaches certain levels and we are way way less than that by orders of magnitude. Will sample again prior to July 4th.

Also, should you have questions or concerns please contact a member of the committee, and we will do our best to answer or find an answer if one exists. However, the quality of the lake rests in the hands of all of us as residents and stewards

2024 BIRCH LAKE CLMP RESULTS

ABOUT THIS REPORT: This report is a summary of the data that have been collected through the Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program. The contents have been customized for your lake. The first page is a summary of the Trophic Status Indicators of your lake (Secchi Disk Transparency, Chlorophyll-a, Spring Total Phosphorus, and Summer Total Phosphorus). Where data are available, they have been summarized for the most recent field season, five years prior to the most recent field season, and since the first year your lake has been enrolled in the program.

If you did not take 8 or more Secchi disk measurements or 4 or more chlorophyll measurements, there will not be summary data calculated for these parameters. These numbers of measurements are required to ensure that the results are indicative of overall summer conditions.

If you enrolled in Dissolved Oxygen/Temperature, the summary page will have a graph of one of the profiles taken during the late summer (typically August or September). If your lake stratifies, we will use a graph showing the earliest time of stratification, because identifying the timing of this condition and the depth at which it occurs is typically the most important use of dissolved oxygen measurements. The last summary page will be an explanation of the Trophic Status Index and where your lake fits on that scale.

The rest of the report will be aquatic plant summaries, Score the Shore results, and larger graphs, including all Dissolved Oxygen/ Temperature Profiles that you recorded. For Secchi Disk, Chlorophyll, and Phosphorus parameters, you need to have two years of data for a graph to make logical sense. Therefore if this is the first year you have enrolled in the CLMP, you will not receive a graph for these parameters. Remember that some lakes see a lot of fluctuation in these parameters

from year to year. Until you have eight years worth of data, consider all trends to be preliminary.





Spring Phosphorus (parts per billion)





With an average TSI score of 37 based on 2024 Secchi transparency, chlorophyll-a, and summer total phosphorus data, this lake is rated between the oligotrophic and mesotrophic classification. The lake leans slightly more oligotrophic than mesotrophic.

The low level of nutrients in the lake results in dissolved oxygen being available throughout the water column for most of the summer. Only by the end of the summer does the lake fully stratify and the bottom waters become anoxic.

While the trends for individual parameters are mixed, monitoring data indicates that overall nutrient levels remain largely unchanged since data collection began.

THE SIX COMMANDMENTS OF BIRCH LAKE WATER QUALITY

- I. Thou shalt prevent the spread of Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS).
- II. Thou shalt minimize surface runoff.
- III. Thou shalt minimize the effects of waves.
- IV. Thou shalt protect and expand Natural Shorelines.
- V. Thou shalt not allow phosphorus, nutrients, and other undesirable chemical elements to enter our lake.
- VI. Thou shalt remain informed and active about other Water Quality issues.

2024 BIRCH LAKE CLMP RESULTS

Tropic Status Explained

In 1977, limnologist Dr. Robert Carlson developed a numerical scale (0-100) where the numbers indicate the level of nutrient enrichment. Using the proper equations, we can convert results from Summer Total Phosphorus, Secchi Depth, and Chlorophyll-a to this Trophic Status Index (TSI). The TSI numbers are furthermore grouped into general categories (oligotrophic, mesotrophic, and hypereutrophic), to quickly give us a way to understand the general nutrient level of any lake.

The tables pictured here give the results-to-TSI conversions for the water quality data ranges normally seen in the CLMP. The formulas for this conversion can be found in the CLMP manual.

Oligotrophic: Generally deep and clear lakes with little aquatic plant or algae growth. These lakes maintain sufficient dissolved oxygen in the cool, deep-bottom waters during late summer to support cold water fish, such as trout and whitefish.

Mesotrophic: Lakes that fall between oligotrophic and eutrophic. Mid-ranged amounts of nutrients.

Eutrophic: Highly productive eutrophic lakes are generally shallow, turbid, and support abundant aquatic plant growth. In deep eutrophic lakes, the cool bottom waters usually contain little or no dissolved oxygen. Therefore, these lakes can only support warm water fish, such as bass and pike.

Hypereutrophic: A specialized category of euthrophic lakes. These lakes exhibit extremely high productivity, such as nuisance algae and weed growth.


BIRCH LAKE SAILING

Since we did not have any Memorial Day weekend races, we are sharing some more basics of sailing for beginners who might be thinking about joining in the races.

In sailboat racing there are no out-of-bounds lines on the floor or referees to call fouls. The rules are self-enforced and administered within the fleet. A basic understanding of just a few important rules will help ensure that everyone has fun and gets home safely.

The specifics of the sailboat racing rules are mindnumbingly detailed and written to cover all potential incidents. DON'T WORRY - you do not need to know everything about the rules to go out and have fun and be safe. By reading and understanding the following rules and terms, you should be able to get around the course without fouling another boat or causing an accident. These rules should only be thought of as a beginning! A full copy of the rules can be found at *ussailing.org*.


Starboard Tack vs Port Tack

BIRCH LAKE HISTORY: HARVEY'S HOUSE

rley K. Harvey purchased 137 acres along the east shore of Birch Lake in 1905 from the Frederic Jones family, and soon thereafter constructed a stone cottage.

Just a few years later, in 1908, Harvey became frustrated that Christian Searer, owner of the mill in Williamsville, raised the dam on the outflow of Birch Lake, causing the lake to rise 21 inches and flooding Harvey's property. He filed suit against Searer, and while he won the case, Searer removed only two boards and the lake level did not decrease sufficiently. Harvey then placed a charge of dynamite at the dam, and removed the offending boards. In the resulting trial, the jury ruled in favor of Harvey, citing a state law that an individual may not raise the level of a lake, resulting in damage to another's property (Niles Daily Sun, December 24, 1909).

Orley and his wife, Lucy O'Dell Harvey, operated a Boat Livery on their east side property. They offered boats for rent and live bait for sale. A 1947 map of Birch Lake identifies "Harvey's Spring

Pool" and the Boat Livery.

Orley and Lucy Harvey were also the proprietors of the Harvey House Hotel in Constantine from approximately 1908 to 1917. When the hotel changed management, the local newspaper wrote that, ' "The present proprietor, O.K. Harvey, has had charge of the Hotel since it opened to the public about 9 years ago. He and his wife Lucy gave the place such a home-like atmosphere, and served such excellent meals that the travelling public said that the Harvey House was one of the best conducted hotels to be found, and guests wanted to make it to Constantine for the fine accommodations to be enjoyed" (Items of Constantine, August, 1917).

In 1924, Harvey laid out and platted the Nun-u-komuk "subdivision," which purportedly means "fair landing." Nun-u-komuk spans from the bottom of Kinsey St. (the Mikulak house today), to the Pence house, just north of the original Harvey home (now Bernaciak's). Few houses were built until the 40s; Helen Weesner wrote a Barker article about her memories of Birch Lake, and said that in the 1930s, starting from her home (now Garceau's), "moving north, there were no cottages until the Ruehl [sic] Harvey house" (*Birch Barker*, 2005).

The Harveys had five children: O'Dell (b. 1888), Edith (b. 1890), Roscoe (b. 1893), Antoinette "Annie" (b. 1897), and Ruel (b. 1901). Ruel married Margaret Reid in 1930, and they lived at the Harvey home on Birch Lake with their children, Nancy (b. 1930), Patricia (b. 1933), John (b. 1937), and Lucy (b. 1939). Nancy Harvey married the Harvey's neighbor, J. Lamar King in 1948 (not the same King listed on the 1920 plat map to the right).

The Harvey family sold their home (cottage #157) to Val, Mary, Ken, and Mary Ellen Bernaciak in 1960. The home remains in the family today, now owned by Kevin and Cindy Bernaciak. The Harvey's house, built circa 1905, has been expanded but the original structure remains recognizable. For the past 120 years, only two families have owned this very early Birch Lake residence!

Birch Lake Man Dynamited Obnoxious Dam.

Cassopolis, Dec. 24.—The recent trial of the Searer-Harvey case here brought out the fact that Harvey had considerable nerve.

Searer had raised the flood, ates to his dam at the outlet of Birch lake, which raised the water in the lake twenty-one inches and brought it up to the Harvey cottage. Harvey got an injunction ordering S-arer to take down the boards, and he took off two, not enough to lower the later.

Then Harvey dynamited the dam and waded in an took out the pieces which the dynamite did not throw out. The jury sided with Harvey, and there is a state law which says that one cannot raise a lake in this manner if it banks water up to anyone's cottage or hotel.



SUMMER RECIPES: MEXICAN BURRIA TACOS

exican birria tacos, Jalisco-style, 1. made with braised beef that's slow-cooked in a fragrant 3-chile sauce 2. with a delicious spice mix. Crispy tacos, and tender, mouth-watering beef team up with melted Mexican cheese in this impressive 3. meal. This meal takes some time, but it's definitely worth it!

Sauce

6 dried guajillo chile peppers, seeded 4 dried chile de arbol peppers, stemmed and seeded

2 dried ancho chiles, stemmed and seeded

1 tablespoon olive oil, or as needed

4 medium Roma tomatoes

2 tablespoons white vinegar

2 cloves garlic

2 teaspoons ground black pepper

4 whole cloves

1 pinch ground cinnamon

1 pinch ground cumin

1 pinch ground thyme

1 pinch dried marjoram

1 pinch dried oregano

1 pinch salt

Meat

4 pounds beef chuck roast salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste

Tacos


18 corn tortillas

1 large white onion, finely chopped

1 bunch fresh cilantro, chopped

1 cup shredded queso asadero (optional)

- 1. Preheat the oven to 325° F. Fill a pot with water and bring to a boil.
- 2. Start the sauce: Add guajillo, arbol, and ancho chile peppers to the boiling water; boil for 5 minutes.
- 3. Remove pot from the heat and allow peppers to soak until cool. Drain, reserving ¼ cup of the water.
- 4. Rinse beef and pat dry. Cut beef into chunks if desired, and season with salt and pepper.
- 5. Heat oil in a Dutch oven over medium-high heat. Add beef and cook until browned on all sides, about 10 minutes.
- 6. While the beef is searing, continue the sauce: Line a heavy cast-iron grill pan or griddle with aluminum foil



- 7. Place cooled chile peppers into a blender. Add grilled tomatoes, vinegar, garlic, black pepper, cloves, cinnamon, cumin, thyme, marjoram, oregano, and salt in a blender. Pour in the reserved ¼ cup water; blend until smooth.
- 8. Strain chile sauce through a mesh strainer and pour over the meat in the Dutch oven, turning the roast so it is completely covered with sauce; cover.
- 9. Bake in the preheated oven, basting meat every 45 minutes with sauce, until birria begins to fall apart, 3 to 4 hours. Remove the lid and bake, uncovered, until birria is crispy on top, about 20 minutes. Remove from oven, cover with aluminum foil, and allow to rest in a warm area for 10 minutes.
- 10. Remove meat to a cutting board and strain off any fat from the sauce. Shred meat with two forks, then return meat to the pot and stir with the sauce to combine.
- 11. Fill each tortilla with birria and top with cheese, chopped onion, and cilantro. Warm the filled tacos on a griddle, flipping until both sides are crispy and cheese is melted.
- 12. Serve with extra sauce on the side for dipping.







IN AN EMERGENCY


