



WATER QUALITY REPORT

Minimizing Environmental Impact Through Considerate Boat Operation

ast summer I wrote an article discussing the environmental impact of wakeboats, and the proper operation of these boats to minimize that impact. In this article, I intend to reiterate the key points from the previous article, as well as expand to include all boats, and how to navigate around some of Birch Lake's features.

First, let me state that the focus of this is on disruption of the lake bottom. We have all been informed of the impact of phosphorus on the lake, with emphasis on human factors like lawn fertilizer. Studies of freshwater lakes have indicated that up to 40% of the phosphorus content in a lake can come from disruption of the lake bottom. That can be human disruption or natural disruption like wind and storms. Phosphorus occurs naturally, and we can't, nor would we want to, eliminate all phosphorus, but we do want it to remain close to the levels that occur naturally. Therefore, minimizing disruption of the lake bottom is in our best interest.

From last year's article, the key points of operation for a wakeboat in surf mode were to stay in water at least 15 feet deep and at least 500 feet from shore. With Birch Lake's shape and depth, this is easy to accomplish just by staying close to the middle of the lake. I have rarely witnessed a wakeboat operating improperly on Birch Lake by these standards. Kudos to those of you who are being considerate and following those guidelines!

What is worth mentioning is that a normal sized runabout boat, 18-23 feet in length, when on plane will disrupt up to 10 feet of water depth. I have witnessed this several times from my own bedroom window. The shallow point in the northeast corner of the lake, which begins roughly in front of the Zesinger's, is easily seen from my home. On numerous occasions I have watched a boat speed over this point and leave a trail of sediment-filled water like an airplane leaving a vapor trail. This is a problem, as re-suspending the nutrients on the lake bottom essentially accelerates algae growth.

Those nutrients are already in the lake, but being packed on the bottom of the lake slows access to these nutrients for



algae growth. If you see that "mud trail" behind your boat, you have essentially fertilized the algae in the lake.

The Water Quality Committee asks that everyone take a few minutes to look at a satellite view of Birch Lake, or review a bottom contour map. Some of the key areas to be aware of (measurements made using Google Earth, so these are my best estimates):

- The point already mentioned in the northeast corner in under 10 feet of depth out approximately 400 feet from shore.
- The west side, notably in front of Jamie Green's home, is under 10 feet of depth at least 250 feet from shore.
- The point in the southwest corner, in front of the Becker home, also is less than 10 feet of depth at 250 feet from shore.
- The shallows in front of Cassady's as you come out of the southeast cove is under 10 feet at over 600 feet from shore.

Additionally, here are some other high negative-impact situations to minimize or avoid:

- Power loading at the boat launch.
 Using the throttle to load or position
 your boat on a trailer stirs up large
 amounts of sediment. Over the
 course of a season on Birch, this may
 well be the most impactful action we
 experience. Best practice would be to
 make sure you back your trailer in
 as far as you can, then use the winch
 on your trailer to bring the boat
 forward.
- Acceleration from low speed. When a boat accelerates, especially from a low speed start, the transom drops deeper into the water, and the angle of the thrust drops down more toward the bottom. The deeper the water you are in when you accelerate, the better. For instance, if you have a skier capable of a deep

- water start, that is preferred versus a shallow water start.
- Low speed use in shallow water. While not as impactful as a high speed boat, the transom generally is deeper in the water at low speeds, and our awareness of our position is often decreased because you are simply at low speed. It is still best to avoid shallow areas.

State regulations put the legal distance to be on plane as 100 feet from the end of any pier or structure. The point of this article isn't to discuss legal operation of a boat; it is to emphasize mindful, considerate operation. The shape and depth of Birch allows for plenty of space to enjoy the lake while also minimizing negative impact.

- I. Thou shalt prevent the spread of Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS).
- II. Thou shalt minimize surface runoff.
- III. Thou shalt minimize the effects of waves.
- IV. Thou shalt protect and expand Natural Shorelines.
- V. Thou shalt not allow phosphorus, nutrients, and other undesirable chemical elements to enter our lake
- VI. Thou shalt remain informed and active about other Water Quality issues.

CAMP T CORNER

s you read this, Camp T is welcoming in the first campers of the summer! We are very excited for the staff to apply everything they have learned over the past two weeks of training, and to see our months of preparations come to fruition. Our staff is prepared, our grounds are ready, and we can't wait for a fantastic first week!

As I mentioned last week, staff training involves many different preparations. I thought I would outline some of the specialized trainings our staff do to make sure they are ready for and can prevent various types of emergencies. All of our staff who attend staff training complete American Red Cross First Aid/CPR/AED certification for adults and children, which involves both online courses and in-person practical skills demonstrations. We use partners and models to practice these skills and give feedback.

All of our lifeguards are required to hold an American Red Cross Lifeguard

Certification, and any who are certified by us here at camp also receive specific Waterfront Skills training that is specific to non-pool environments. These certifications require lifeguards to be able to swim laps, tread water, hold their breath, and swim while carrying weights. They also learn and practice rescuing swimmers in multiple different scenarios, including conscious and unconscious, injured or uninjured, etc.

Any staff members who attend staff training also receive a certification in Youth Mental Health First Aid. Staff learn to identify warning signs and risk factors of mental illnesses, as well as how to promote their own and campers' mental health through positive self-care techniques. Staff learn the steps of deescalating crisis situations, if needed. All of these trainings ensure that our staff can adequately prepare for and respond to emergencies, so that we can provide the best and safest possible care for all of our campers.

A fun and additional training exercise our staff got to participate in last week included a visit by the 6th and 7th grade students from Christ the King School in South Bend for their field day! We taught them activities such as low ropes (team building), drama, handcraft, nature, archery, and sports & games. It was a great way for the students to end their school year, and a great way for our staff to practice their leadership skills!

In addition to summer camp, we at Camp T love hosting all kinds of other events. We also host retreats, reunions, weddings, and more! Our own School Year Programs Director, Miss Carmen, got married to her husband Robert at Camp T in early May. It was a beautiful ceremony, and we want to send her our warmest congratulations!



This week's historical feature is the history of Birch Lake's "Sunset View," the Sears/Larson/Witchie cottage #106. The property has remained in their family for five generations!

President Andrew Jackson signed the original land sale transaction to Henry and Ann Fowler in 1833. Subsequent owners were the Gards, the Cramptons, the Tillottsons, and the Merritts. On June 18, 1906, Charles and Mary Merritt sold to Henry Sears (Linda Larson Witchie's great-grandfather).

Henry Sears had viewed the property in the late 1800's and fell in love with it. He became a sheep farmer in Iowa and Nebraska, so he could earn enough money to move back and purchase the property. At that time, the lakeside property spanned the distance from the boat launch to the Haines/DeCocker/Mikulak home at the bottom of Kinsey St., and extended as far south as Shavehead Lake. In 1924 or 1925 Henry subdivided the lake parcel and sold to relatives, friends, and neighbors from Elkhart.

Helen Weesner's parents and the ancestors of Linda Lott Yoshizawa were among those who purchased the subdivided lots, and their families remained here for many, many years. Henry Sears also gave the boat launch property to Cass County in exchange for moving the road away from the lake. The road was originally next to the lake and was relocated so houses could sit between the lake and the road. It is rumored that a disgruntled driver was angry about the detour and would sit in the old roadway and honk at the house that was placed where the road used to be.



Henry Sears's wife (Ocenia "Emma" Rinehart Sears) and two other children (twins Edith Sears and Edward "Ned" Sears) quit-claimed the property to Arthur Sears (Linda's grandfather) in 1931. Arthur moved a tenant farm house that was located on Sears' family farmland near Shavehead Lake to the cottage's current location. The two story, four room structure was rolled on logs, and horses were used to pull the load. The cottage was added on to five or six times during the next 50 years, including digging out the basement in the late 1930's. The rock seawall was built in 1942.

Supposedly, the Sears family was the first on the lake to waterski in 1946, using a wooden boat and 25 H.P. engine. From 1947 to 1955, Linda's parents, Ray and Ruth Ann ("Fran") Larson spent lots of time at Birch Lake in the summers, and ice-skated there in the winters. In 1959 the property was passed on to Linda's mom. The property at that time included the cottage, woods on either side of it, woods up the hill, a clay tennis court, a garage, and a pony corral. Fran Larson passed away in 1986, and the property was subdivided once again, this time to Linda and her siblings. In 1991, Ron and Linda Witchie purchased some of Linda's siblings' portions and became the new owners of the cottage and the woods behind it.

Linda has happily spent more than 60 summers at Birch Lake. Her favorite memories growing up here were 1) playing Marco Polo with her siblings and cousins, 2) camping out in the tree house with friends from town, 3) waterskiing with lake neighbors, 4) playing tennis, croquet, shuffleboard, badminton, and archery, 5) practicing piano at her cousin Genevieve Lagoni's cottage (Genevieve was the daughter of Wallace Parker and Edith Sears, who was mentioned above), and 6) visiting an elderly neighbor who always greeted everyone with homemade soft sugar cookies. Topping the list of neighbor's favorite memories of the Larson household were the pony rides given to kids around the lake by Linda's older siblings.

Ron and Linda started coming to the lake together in 1987. Friends from Ann Arbor were invited for 4th of July. Now, almost 40 years later, those same four couples still visit every 4th of July weekend. The couples turned into families, and this spring, the first grandchild of that group was born. The cottage has also been a wonderful place to host family reunions.

Names may have changed and properties may have been passed on to new families, but one thing remains the same...Birch Lake neighbors are among the friendliest and best anywhere! Ron and Linda would like to thank all of the dedicated volunteers who keep our lake so wonderful.








SUMMER RECIPES: RHUBARB CRISP

aking a crisp is one of the best and easiest ways to highlight seasonal fruit. Crisps come together quickly with no special equipment, and they are a great way to use the odds and ends of fruit in your refrigerator. This recipe highlights one of early summer's finest flavors: rhubarb. It is often paired with berries, but it still shines on its own, with tart, puckery flavor and gorgeous color. Browned butter struesel adds a sweet note to the topping, making this an almost-effortless, high-impact dessert.

Ingredients:

Strawberry Rhubarb Filling

- 1 pound fresh rhubarb, cut into ½ inch pieces
- 1 pound fresh strawberries, sliced
- 34 cup granulated sugar
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/8 teaspoon salt

Browned Butter Struesel Topping

½ cup butter

- ³4 cup all-purpose flour
- 34 cup old fashioned oats
- 34 cup packed brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/8 teaspoon salt

Directions

1. Brown the butter for the struesel topping. Melt the butter in a small saucepan over medium heat. Continue heating the butter, stirring frequently. As the butter cooks, it will begin to bubble and foam. Continue cooking and stirring until the butter turns golden brown with little browned bits on the bottom of the pan, about 5-8 minutes. Transfer the butter to a small bowl and place in the refrigerator to let

it cool slightly while you prepare the strawberry rhubarb filling.

- 2. Preheat the oven to 350°F.
- 3. Add all of the strawberry rhubarb filling ingredients to an 8-9 inch skillet or baking dish and mix together.
- 4. To make the streusel, mix together the flour, oats, brown sugar, cinnamon and salt. Pour in the brown butter and use a fork to mix together until combined but crumbly. Sprinkle the streusel over the strawberry rhubarb filling.
- 5. Place the skillet or baking dish on a parchament lined baking sheet in case the filling bubbles over. Bake uncovered for about 40-45 minutes, or until the edges are bubbling and the fruit is tender.
- 6. Let cool for one hour. Serve with a big scoop of vanilla ice cream!


EMERGENCY HEART DEFIBRILLATOR (AED) locations on Birch Lake

- **6. Southwest Shore:** De Young Home 63255 Storey Hill Street

All units are on the **ROAD SIDE** of the property and accessible by vehicle or on foot.






IN AN EMERGENCY


