



WATER QUALITY REPORT: VOICES OF BIRCH LAKE

Tennifer Ball asked me to write a water quality article for the Birch Barker. She seemed to think that people would be interested in the personal memories of a now-senior citizen who has been at the lake since early childhood. I sincerely doubt that, but Jennifer is persistent, and I can't risk angering such a good neighbor.

Except for the summer I was born (1956, when Dad was an officer in the Air Force and stationed in California), I've spent every summer since infancy at Birch

Lake. My early childhood memories are nearly as fuzzy as my college memories, but one of my earliest recollections is being fascinated by the sunlight sparkling like diamonds on the blue water. It probably reminded me of Uncle Scrooge McDuck's jewel-filled swimming pool in the comic books (Holly says no one under 50 will know who that is).

All through the 1960s and into the 1970s, there were still quite a few unbuilt areas around the lake, especially in the Cove and on the West side. Cottages were smaller and rustic. Utilities were often unreliable. The electricity seemed to go out every time a squirrel sneezed. The few cottages which had telephones were on a party line system where anyone could listen in on others' calls. Septic systems had a nasty habit of not cooperating - usually when guests were expected. Wells and pumps were treated gingerly, and a common expectation was for the males of the family to wash in the lake, not the shower. Many piers had bars of soap and bottles of shampoo stationed at their deep ends for that purpose.

Most power boats were small runabouts with what now seem like laughably small outboard engines. As a kid I remember my dad and a group of his friends, all of whom had been college athletes, water skiing behind a 35hp outboard engine on a little fiberglass cockleshell of a boat. Two of the guys had to go forward on the deck to help the struggling boat plane out, while the skier was dragged half-submerged around the lake.

All through this primitive period, the blue waters of Birch Lake sparkled like diamonds. When I visited friends who lived on other lakes, I would tease them by saying it looked like they had forgotten to flush their lake.

But as time passed there was less open shoreline as new and bigger cottages were built, all with septic systems of more or less reliability. Every year power boats and engines became larger and more powerful. From the mid-1960s to the early 1980s, for example, my family's boats went from a 35hp outboard to a 40hp, to a 55hp, then to a 150hp inboard/outboard, then to a 275hp inboard/outboard. Moreover, most cottages were owned by young families whose kids were out using those boats from morning to night. We would only come ashore to get more boat gas.

About the time I was in college I noticed that the lake was looking tired. At times there was an unwholesome murky tint to the water. This displeased me because I couldn't tease friends about their lakes anymore.

The lake's water quality was at real risk of spiraling downwards to become unsalvageable. Fortunately, Gert Temple made it her mission to save the lake's water quality. Through her impressive dedication and efforts, all the septic systems on the lake were upgraded. That saved the lake for nearly 20 years. The water resumed its blue clarity and sparkled like diamonds again.

Sewers were installed around the lake in 2006. That was a very divisive issue at the lake. Due to the success that Gert Temple had achieved, many questioned the need for sewers right then.

Now, except for Camp Tannadoonah and Lake Park and a lot in the southwest corner, all the shoreline on Birch Lake has dwellings on it, many of which are shoehorned together from lot line to lot line. Power boats are ever larger and more powerful. My ski boat for example has a 330hp inboard engine but it is dwarfed by the powerful engines of some of the new wake surfing boats and even by some pontoon boats' outboard engines.

Do those factors put the lake at risk of another crisis for water quality? Potentially, but I am optimistic. Why? Well, for one thing, most of the houses at the lake are (with a few



exceptions) not occupied by young families, but by older folk who might only have grandchildren visit on the occasional weekend. So, many of the new big boats only rarely get used intensively, and many of them are just pontoons or tritoons anyway that don't make much of a wake. The rest of the time most of the watercraft here, despite their impressive horsepower, just sit in their lifts or putter around the lake on cocktail cruises.


But the main reason I am optimistic is that Birch Lake has such a great group of lake residents on our water quality committee. These neighbors of ours are experienced and dedicated and they work quietly but tirelessly to monitor and protect our lake.

So, while it is usual for older people to complain about things being worse now than in their remembered past, some things do get better. Back then there were no eagles or osprey

at the lake. Back then the county would spray used engine oil on the many dirt roads to keep the dust down. Back then mosquito control meant DDT and spreading a film of gasoline on ponds and ditches so the larvae couldn't breathe.

The water quality at Birch Lake has ebbed and flowed over the years. It is at a good point now. With vigilance, care, and common sense, the blue waters at Birch Lake can continue to sparkle like diamonds in a way that would make Uncle Scrooge McDuck envious. ~Submitted by Scott Troeger



CAMP T CORNER

t has been absolutely devastating for us here at Camp T to hear of the Ldestructive flooding happening in Texas, specifically at Camp Mystic. The camp community has always been deeply interconnected, and it is never felt more so than when a tragedy like this occurs. We send our deepest condolences to the families of the campers, camp staff, and everyone else affected by this unimaginable disaster. We have been in contact with one of our staffing agencies, the International Exchange of North America (IENA) to offer to take in international staff displaced by the floods. The American Camp Association has links to ways that you can help, if you are interested, at acacamps.org.

When tragedies like this occur, it can naturally bring worry. For camp staff, it causes us to consider and reevaluate our emergency preparedness procedures. Sending your child to camp requires an enormous amount of trust, and we at Camp T consider the safety of everyone on our property to be our top priority. We'd like to reassure everyone that we have carefully developed, practiced, and regularly reviewed emergency protocols.

Although Camp T is a largely techfree camp, all of our leadership staff and the nurse carry their phones in case of emergencies. We use these to access the weather forecasts throughout the day, and are notified by the National Weather Service in the case of severe weather. If a tornado watch is issued or the conditions at camp become otherwise unsafe, members of the leadership team alert staff and the campers they are responsible for to report to the closest of three buildings which have a basement for emergency shelter - Morris Lodge, the Dining Hall, and the Welcome Center.

While sheltering in these buildings, members of the leadership team are in communication with each other and monitoring the weather, while the rest of the staff entertain the campers with games and songs. If the weather worsens, or a tornado warning is issued, we move everyone to the basement shelters. In the case of a loss of power, a generator turns on to power the shower house and the Dining Hall.

During any inclement weather, communication with parents and families is also a priority. The main mode of communication is through text alerts and emails, and we may also post updates on our social media accounts. Updates are given when we move to our safe buildings, to basements, and then when weather conditions improve enough to resume normal activities. The lines of communication are always open for any family members who have additional questions or concerns.

In case of medical emergencies, our nearest hospital is about 15 minutes away in Three Rivers. The Newberg Township fire department is within a ten minute



drive, and they have toured our camp grounds and are familiar with the layout of our property if they are ever called in an emergency.

Please be assured that the camp staff have been well-trained in how to handle these kinds of situations, and the leadership staff have past experience in dealing with severe weather and a multitude of other emergency procedures. We understand the gravity of the responsibility we carry in caring for the children - and staff - at camp and do not take it lightly. Again, our thoughts are with all who have been affected by the tragedy in Texas.

BIRCH LAKE HISTORY: COWEN FAMILY

lifford and Avanelle Cowen were close friends with a group from the First Methodist Church in Mishawaka - Floyd and Ruth Fulmer, Harry and Bernice Hatcher, Lawrence and Ruth Brooke, and Dee and Helen Shewman. The group tent camped together at Birch Lake beginning as early as 1934. For two summers, they all rented "the Domer" cottage on the east side. This would later become Jim and Shirley (Wentworth) Blue's house (E131).

In 1945, the Fulmers purchased a lot at Birch Lake and started building their cottage, "Dunkampin" (W302). Floyd let his friends know he had picked out lots for them too! They drove out to the lake to check them out, and back to South Bend to talk to the owner of the land, Tom Hogan, and bought the lots.

The Cowens had two children, Dick and Carolyn, who were 10 and 7 years old when they started building their cottage at Birch Lake. Dick remembers that the road behind the house was just two dirt tire tracks with grass growing in between. He says you couldn't see the lake from the road because the trees and underbrush were so dense. The shoreline was marshy, and they moved dirt and sand to fill it in and make it possible to walk to the edge of the water.

The Cowens built a two-story cottage in 1946, with a woodburning stove for heat when they visited in the winter. The second story was unfinished at the time, and just had beds upstairs. They called their cottage "Cowen's Cove" (W308) because of the small inlet or "nook" on the north edge of their shoreline. Avanelle was a teacher and had summers off, so they spent the entire summer at the lake each year.

Dick recalls swimming at the public beach that was located in the cove, and swimming all the way across the lake to Lazy Lodge. He and his friends fished and biked and waterskiied on the lake, and even built their own waterskis! Dick was friends with Jack and Bob Marsh who lived a few doors down (later owned by the Toths, W320). Jack had the paper route around the lake, and Dick would sub for him when they were on vacation. The paper was dropped off at Lanky's, and they would pick it up and deliver it around the lake on their bikes. Chuck Schott (south side) would bring Barkers over to Dick, and he would walk along the west side and sell them for a dime.

They had a 25HP Johnson motor and the kids skiied behind it! When Dick was in college at Indiana University, they upgraded to a 40HP and he said they would "run it all day" on the lake. Friends from college would visit and they all skiied - even building a 3-man pyramid!

Dick married Peggy Cleland in 1956. After a short honeymoon, they came back to the lake to spend a few days at the cottage. After they were already in bed, his parents and the neighbors all showed up with cake and ice cream to celebrate! Irv Bowers (next door at W307) had a station wagon, and Dick and Peggy rode around the lake on the back tailgate in their pajamas, to the cheers of the neighbors. Dick recalls that when they returned to the cottage to go to bed, someone had snuck inside and tied a cowbell to the underside of their bed! The story even made it into the Cassopolis Vigilant.

Birch lake residents all wondered about all the noise and the parade of cars all sounding their horns like mad Sunday evening, July 22. Well, it was a belling for Richard Cowen and his new wife who was Peggy Cleland. They were married Friday, July 20th and are living at the lake. Congratulations, Dick and Peggy!

Cassopolis Vigilant, August 2, 1956, p. 2

In 1958 Clifford and Avanelle had the cottage insulated, and the upstairs finished with knotty pine, and in 1963 added an upstairs bathroom. In 1966, they retired, sold their home in Mishawaka, and moved to the lake, spending winters in Florida each year.

That same year, Dick and Peggy bought a cottage on the west side (W354). They bought the property from Herm and Bev Kruggel, located where the Rassmussen's garage is today. They stayed at that cottage with their three children, Steven, Stacia, and Bradley until the mid-70s when they moved to Osceola along the river. Dick and Peggy were active in the Birch Lake community for many years. He served as Commodore in 1969, and Peggy was the Secretary for the BLYC.

Dick and Peggy returned to Birch Lake around 1995, buying a house on the west side (W350, where Soldato's live now). They spent most of the year at the lake, and wintered in The Villages in Florida.

Clifford and Avanelle passed down

their cottage to Dick and his sister Carolyn, and they shared it as a place for their children and grandchildren to visit. After Carolyn passed away in 1997, Dick and Peggy's daughter Stacia and her family bought Carolyn's half of the cottage, and they rented it out to lake visitors. When Stacia's children, Gregory, Elizabeth, and Janelle were teenagers, they sold their half of the cottage back to Dick and Peggy.

In 2004, Dick and Peggy sold their place farther down the west side and built their new home at W308. They had to cut down two huge oak trees to make way for the new house, and had the trees milled to make flooring for the second floor and stairs. They had planned to save the knotty pine from the upstairs of the original cottage, and use it in the new house, but it was unfortunately lost when the company that was restoring it burned down.

Today, Dick and Peggy's daughter Stacia lives year-round at W308, and Dick visits from Florida each year. Their 6 grandchildren, and 5 great-grandchildren love to visit Birch Lake!


EMERGENCY HEART DEFIBRILLATOR (AED) locations on Birch Lake

All units are on the **ROAD SIDE** of the property and accessible by vehicle or on foot.






IN AN EMERGENCY






