





WATER QUALITY REPORT: THE SIX COMMANDMENTS

The Water Quality Committee has developed a list of six "do's and don'ts" for protecting and improving our lake. We ask that you learn about and try to comply with our "Six Commandments" which are listed below. Today, we're reviewing Commandment #1: "Thou shall Prevent the Spread of Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS)".

Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) refers to all non-native organisms living in or

near our bodies of water. Examples include zebra mussels, aggressive weeds and fish diseases. Because they typically have no natural predatory, competing, or limiting species, AIS can overwhelm a body of water very quickly. Once an AIS visits a body of water it may be controlled, but rarely eliminated. Currently there are hundreds of known forms of AIS.

AIS threatens the health of our lakes and rivers, decreases water quality, and can limit recreational enjoyment. It has been estimated that the total economic impact of AIS in the Great Lakes region is \$5.7 billion per year. Within the last few decades, rampant AIS at a few lakes within 60 miles of Birch has caused Michigan's DNR to partially drain and close those lakes for use for a year or more.

At Birch, we already have the presence of at least these following known types of AIS:

- 1. Eurasian Milfoil (EM) for which we survey and treat annually.
- Purple Loosestrife for which our committee, lead by Bruce Wagner, hunts and then oversees the removal of every late summer.
- 3. Curly Leaf Pondweed for which we monitor, but treatment has not yet been required.
- 4. Hybrid Eurasian Milfoil the forms of which we now have are being controlled by the product currently being used for regular EM.

A particularly nasty species, Starry Stonewort, has already been discovered in numerous nearby bodies of water including our own mill pond. Numerous other forms of AIS thrive in the area and threaten us regularly. For these reasons, each year we hire outside experts to survey then professionally treat each area.

Movement of boats and trailers among water bodies is the most common way AIS is spread in Michigan. Washing boats and trailers is an obvious and relatively easy way to stop the spread. An updated Michigan law requires that we:

- 1. Remove aquatic organisms, including plants from boats, boating equipment and boat trailers before launching or placing them in the water or transporting any watercraft over land.
- 2. Pull plugs and drain live wells, bilges, ballast tanks and all water from boats before leaving the access site.
- 3. Dispose of unused bait in the trash. Do not release bait into the water.
- 4. Don't transfer fish to water bodies other than where they were caught.
- 5. Inspect and remove plants and mud from boats, trailers and gear then dry equipment before leaving the access area.
- 6. Dispose of the material in a trash receptacle or otherwise away from the water body.
- 7. Power wash boats, trailers and gear before leaving the access area if possible, or at a nearby car wash or at home.
- 8. Clean our boats and equipment before and after use in a new body of water.
- 9. Don't allow the cleaning residue from a previous body of water to runoff into a different body of water.
- 10. After cleaning, dry boats and equipment most invasives and significant fish diseases will die if left to dry out of the water for five days.
- 11. Disinfect live wells, bilges and gear with a mild bleach solution $\frac{1}{2}$ cup bleach to five gallons of water.
- 12. Do not dump fish and plants from aquariums into a body of water unless you are certain that each variety of living matter therein is native to that body of water.

In summary, please be mindful not to place or dump anything that may be invasive into our lake or into a place that may eventually wash into our lake. This means anywhere within the Birch Lake watershed. Unwanted and objectionable objects include plants, fish, bait, aquarium remnants and even crawfish leftover from a "boil".



THE SIX COMMANDMENTS OF BIRCH LAKE WATER QUALITY

- I. Thou shalt prevent the spread of Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS).
- II. Thou shalt minimize surface runoff.
- III. Thou shalt minimize the effects of waves.
- IV. Thou shalt protect and expand Natural Shorelines.
- V. Thou shalt not allow phosphorus, nutrients, and other undesirable chemical elements to enter our lake.
- VI. Thou shalt remain informed and active about other Water Quality issues.

FLEET CAPTAIN'S CORNER

Infortunately, it was yet another non-sailable Sunday morning last week at Birch Lake. Fortunately, there was some area sailing to whet our appetite. The 116th Chicago Yacht Club Race to Mackinac was this past weekend. For all non-sailors, this race is held on Lake Michigan, between Chicago and the Mackinac Island area. The "Mac Race" is the oldest annual freshwater distance race in the world, with the first being held in 1898. There are typically over 300 boats, crewed by more than 3,000 sailors, who participate.

They are divided into two major divisions: "Cruising" and "Racing." The race is 290 nautical miles and typically takes 40 to 60 hours for most of the fleet to complete. A few crews over the years have finished the race in under a day, including one owned and skippered by Roy Disney in 2002. It is an aspiration for many sailors in the area to one day participate in this race.

A few Birch Lake residents have participated over the years, including Tom and Barb Cassady and our new cove neighbors, Tom and Rose Eslinger. Tom and Rose Eslinger won their division in 2022, finishing at 3:19am, after an elapsed time of 1 day, 14 hours, and 59 minutes!








BIRCH LAKE HISTORY: MACHALLECK FAMILY

John and Arline Machalleck purchased the Kesler cottage (#51) on the south side in 1954. They had heard about Birch Lake from Paul Thayer (north shore) and came to look at two houses for sale in the spring of 1954. They initially put down a \$10 deposit on a log cabin on the west shore, but when they heard the Kesler cottage was available they forfeited their \$10 and landed on the south shore.




The original Machalleck cottage, 1956

Like many lake families at the time, the family would move to the lake for the entire summer each year. Mike, Steve, Marianne, and Kathy learned to ski behind the Zesinger's 10hp Lonestar boat, before purchasing a 1955 Nilescraft with a 25hp Johnson motor. Mike says groups of kids would ski - learning slalom and trick skiing - for hours every day, switching to someone else's boat when the 6 gallon gas tanks ran out.

There were groups of kids of varying age groups and they did something together every day - swimming in the lake, skiing, diving off the Machalleck's spring board, kick the can, hide and seek, playing cards and board games on rainy days. At night there were street dances or square dances in the Haines' garage, walking around the lake, ice cream at Lazy Lodge, and midnight sailing.

The Birch Lake Yacht Club was looking for somewhere permanent to meet, and the Howard family on the south side donated 6 or 7 back lots for that purpose around 1959. There was an active Junior Yacht Club at the time, and Mike served as President. Mike, along with fellow Junior Yacht Club Members Mike Foote and Lynn Weaver, drew up plans, surveyed the lot, and cleared trees. Starr Wentworth (west shore) was an architect and helped with the design of the club house.

The members of the BLYC did not want to borrow funds and have a mortgage to pay on the building, so they built a modest cement block structure with a flat roof. The pitched roof and indoor bathrooms were added later. Ramon "Bing" Messner, a lake resident who was a builder, coordinated a volunteer crew to construct the building. To raise funds for the club, they used the

building to store boats in the winter.

In December of 1960, a fire completely destroyed the two houses to the east of the Machalleck cottage (owned by the Hull and Meringa families), and damaged the Machalleck cottage and Mullin cottage (to the east). The following spring, the Merginas purchased the now-empty Hull lot, and sold half of it (15 feet) to the Machallecks, making each of their lots 45 feet. The Meringas built a new home, and the Machallecks expanded their cottage, adding a second story.

In 1978, Mike and Katha purchased three cottages at the lake - \$46 (now Wiseman's), \$54 (their current home), and E146 (now Harman's) and utilized them as rental homes for a few years. Around 1981, they offered to sell two of the rental to the first renters, and Dan Reynolds purchased \$46 and Don and Lind Harman purchased E146. Mike and Katha kept \$54, next door to his parents' home.

When John retired in 1982, he and Arline split their time between Birch Lake and Florida. They were active in the BLYC, with John serving as Commodore in 1961, and Arline chairing the Social Committee for several years. John was also a Cass County Commissioner, appointed in 1985 to fill a vacated seat on the board.

Mike was also active in the BLYC, as a junior member, a sailor, and then an adult member. He sailed Snipes from 1957 to 1963 before leaving to serve in the Navy, and returned to sail in the Sunfish Class from 1969-1995. Mike says they sailed every Sunday, even if there was no wind. If it took longer than 30 minutes to get from the start to the first buoy, the race would be canceled!

Mike served as Commodore twice, in 1986 and 2001. Only one other lake resident to our knowledge served as Commodore more than once - Earl Troeger was Commodore three times, in 1964, 1982, and 1983. Mike also served as treasurer of the BLYC from 1990-2000, and fleet captain for several years.

Mike and Katha have two children, Brian and Lori, and they continued the tradition of spending summers at Birch Lake each year when their kids were young. Mike and Katha also helped with the Pancake Breakfast for many years, serving as the cashiers and greeting guests at the breakfast. Mike was a regular participant in the Birch Lake triathlon, and Katha helped with

the event. Katha also helped update, publish, and distribute the BLYC directory with Barb Zesinger when Barb was the editor of the Barker in the 90s.

In 1997 they renovated their house to make it a permanent residence, and moved in full time. When Mike retired from Claeys Candy in 2000, they became snow birds and spend winters in Florida each year.

John and Arline left their Birch Lake home to their four children, and it was used as a rental for a few years. In 2015

Mike and Katha bought the property from his siblings, and in 2016 they tore down the original Machalleck cottage. With the original lot (Sylvan Shores #19), the Meringa lot (#17), and the lot in between that they split in 1961 (#18), they now have 120 feet of frontage on the lake.

Their two children, their spouses, and three grandchildren (Addison, Brynn, and John) all enjoy visits to the lake. Today, Mike and Katha live at the lake in the summers, and spend winters in Vero Beach, Florida. They will celebrate 56 years of marriage in August of 2025.







SUMMER RECIPES: ZUCCHINI-RICOTTA FLATBREAD

s your garden starting to produce an abundance of zucchini? If so, this is the perfect summery flatbread recipe to use up a couple of them! It uses an easy 1-hour homemade flatbread recipe which makes 2 flatbreads.

yeast 1 teaspoon granulated sugar

cup warm water (100°-110°F) 2 cups all purpose

flour or bread flour

1 tablespoon olive oil

1 teaspoon salt

Toppings

1 teaspoon active dry 2 cups halved cherry tomatoes 1 tablespoon olive oil salt and pepper to taste 2 cups part-skim ricotta cheese 3 tablespoons chopped fresh basil 2 tablespoons milk


1-2 teaspoons fresh lemon juice 2 teaspoons minced garlic

2 cups sliced zucchini (1-2 medium

6-8 ounces goat cheese (optional) crushed red pepper flakes (optional)

Instructions:

- Whisk the yeast, sugar, and warm water together in the bowl of your stand mixer. Loosely cover and allow to sit for 5–10 minutes until foamy and frothy on top.
- Add the flour, olive oil, and salt (and garlic/seasoning if using). Mix on low speed with the dough hook attachment until combined, about 2 minutes. The dough should pull away from the sides of the bowl as it mixes. If the dough is too sticky, mix in more flour, 1 tablespoon at a time.
- Knead for an additional 6-8 full minutes, or knead by hand on a lightly floured surface for 6-8 full minutes.
- Place the dough in a greased bowl and cover with plastic wrap, aluminum foil, or a clean kitchen towel. Allow to rise for $\hat{4}5$ minutes at room temperature.
- As the dough is resting and rising, prepare the toppings. Preheat oven to 400°F. Toss the halved cherry tomatoes with 1 tablespoon olive oil and a sprinkle of salt and pepper. Bake for about 20 minutes until blistered and roasted.

- Turn the oven up to 475°F.
- Whisk the ricotta, basil, milk, lemon juice, and garlic together in a medium bowl. Add salt and pepper to taste.
- Punch the dough down and divide in half. On a lightly floured surface with floured hands and working with one dough piece at a time, begin shaping and stretching the dough until it is ¼ inch thick. Don't worry about the shape of the dough, just make sure it's pretty thin. Carefully transfer both pieces of dough to a parchment paper or silicone-mat lined baking sheet, or use a pizza stone.
- Prick a few holes in the dough with a fork. Brush each with 1 teaspoon of olive oil. Spread half of the ricotta mixture onto each, then top with zucchini, tomatoes, and crumbled goat cheese.
- 10. Bake for 15-20 minutes or until the crust and toppings are browned to your liking. Remove from the oven and sprinkle with crushed red pepper, fresh basil, and/or freshly ground pepper. Slice and serve warm.




IN AN EMERGENCY


